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## SOVIET NUCLEAR TEST:

The Soviet Union conducted an underground nuclear blast Wednesday at its test site in Semipalatinsk in central Asia, the first ever to be directly monitored by U.S. scientists on Soviet territory.

**SOLIDARITY MEETING:** Solidarity leader Lech Walesa and a government minister meet today to prepare for round-table talks between officials and opposition leaders aimed at ending Poland's crisis, the government said.

**DISPUTES CHARGE:** Confessed hijacker Mohammed Ali Hamadi denied that he led the 1985 TWA hijacking that claimed the life of a U.S. Navy diver and held 39 Americans for 17 days.

## RANSOM REPORTED PAID FOR HOSTAGE RELEASE

A \$22.2 million ransom was believed paid to win the release of West German Rudolf Cordes from his captors in Lebanon, a West German newspaper reported Wednesday.

Despite strong denials by his employer and government officials, the daily *Bild* said the money was deposited into Arabian bank accounts to secure Cordes' freedom.

He arrived home Tuesday after 20 months of captivity by pro-Iranian Shiite Moslems.

Said Wolfgang Schaeuble, who heads West Germany's Middle East crisis group: "There were no
