JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States permitting the President to grant a pardon to an individual only after such individual has been convicted.

1 *Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives*
2 *of the United States of America in Congress assembled*
3 *(two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the fol-*
4 *lowing article is proposed as an amendment to the Con-*
5 *stitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all*
6 *intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when*

1 ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several
2 States within seven years after the date of its submission
3 for ratification:

4 “ARTICLE —

5 “The President shall only have the power to grant
6 a reprieve or a pardon for an offense against the United
7 States to an individual who has been convicted of such
8 an offense.”.
