Mr. EDWARDS of Texas introduced the following bill; which was referred to
the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

For the relief of Jung Ja Golden.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. IMMEDIATE RELATIVE STATUS FOR JUNG JA**
4 **GOLDEN.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—Jung Ja Golden shall be classified
6 as an immediate relative within the meaning of section
7 201(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Immigration and Nationality Act
8 for purposes of approval of a relative visa petition filed
9 under section 204 of such Act by Jung Ja Golden and
10 the filing of an application for an immigrant visa or for
11 adjustment of status.

1 (b) ADJUSTMENT OF STATUS.—If Jung Ja Golden
2 enters the United States before the filing deadline speci-
3 fied in subsection (c), she shall be considered to have en-
4 tered and remained lawfully and shall, if otherwise eligible,
5 be eligible for adjustment of status under section 245 of
6 the Immigration and Nationality Act as of the date of the
7 enactment of this Act.

8 (c) DEADLINE FOR APPLICATION AND PAYMENT OF
9 FEES.—Subsections (a) and (b) shall apply only if the pe-
10 tition and the application for issuance of an immigrant
11 visa or the application for adjustment of status are filed
12 by Jung Ja Golden with appropriate fees within 2 years
13 after the date of the enactment of this Act.

14 (d) REDUCTION OF IMMIGRANT VISA NUMBER.—
15 Upon the granting of an immigrant visa or permanent res-
16 idence to Jung Ja Golden, the Secretary of State shall
17 instruct the proper officer to reduce by 1, for the following
18 fiscal year, the total number of immigrant visas available
19 under section 201(c)(1)(A) of the Immigration and
20 Nationality Act.

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
