A BILL

Making appropriations for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1994, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5 fiscal year ending September 30, 1994, for military func-
6 tions administered by the Department of Defense, and for
7 other purposes, namely:

TITLE I

MILITARY PERSONNEL

MILITARY PERSONNEL, ARMY

1 For pay, allowances, individual clothing, interest on
2 deposits, gratuities, permanent change of station travel
3 (including all expenses thereof for organizational move-
4 ments), and expenses of temporary duty travel between
5 permanent duty stations, for members of the Army on ac-
6 tive duty (except members of reserve components provided
7 for elsewhere), cadets, and aviation cadets; and for pay-
8 ments pursuant to section 156 of Public Law 97-377, as
9 amended (42 U.S.C. 402 note), to section 229(b) of the
10 Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 429(b)), and to the De-
11 partment of Defense Military Retirement Fund;
12 \$21,571,207,000.

MILITARY PERSONNEL, NAVY

13 For pay, allowances, individual clothing, interest on
14 deposits, gratuities, permanent change of station travel
15 (including all expenses thereof for organizational move-
16 ments), and expenses of temporary duty travel between
17 permanent duty stations, for members of the Navy on ac-
18 tive duty (except members of the Reserve provided for
19 elsewhere), midshipmen, and aviation cadets; and for pay-
20 ments pursuant to section 156 of Public Law 97-377, as
21 amended (42 U.S.C. 402 note), to section 229(b) of the
22

1 Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 429(b)), and to the De-
2 partment of Defense Military Retirement Fund;
3 \$18,633,383,000.

4 MILITARY PERSONNEL, MARINE CORPS

5 For pay, allowances, individual clothing, interest on
6 deposits, gratuities, permanent change of station travel
7 (including all expenses thereof for organizational move-
8 ments), and expenses of temporary duty travel between
9 permanent duty stations, for members of the Marine
10 Corps on active duty (except members of the Reserve pro-
11 vided for elsewhere); and for payments pursuant to section
12 156 of Public Law 97-377, as amended (42 U.S.C. 402
13 note), to section 229(b) of the Social Security Act (42
14 U.S.C. 429(b)), and to the Department of Defense Mili-
15 tary Retirement Fund; \$5,763,117,000.

16 MILITARY PERSONNEL, AIR FORCE

17 For pay, allowances, individual clothing, interest on
18 deposits, gratuities, permanent change of station travel
19 (including all expenses thereof for organizational move-
20 ments), and expenses of temporary duty travel between
21 permanent duty stations, for members of the Air Force
22 on active duty (except members of reserve components
23 provided for elsewhere), cadets, and aviation cadets; and
24 for payments pursuant to section 156 of Public Law 97-
25 377, as amended (42 U.S.C. 402 note), to section 229(b)

1 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 429(b)), and to the
2 Department of Defense Military Retirement Fund;
3 \$15,916,937,000.

4 RESERVE PERSONNEL, ARMY

5 For pay, allowances, clothing, subsistence, gratuities,
6 travel, and related expenses for personnel of the Army Re-
7 serve on active duty under sections 265, 3021, and 3038
8 of title 10, United States Code, or while serving on active
9 duty under section 672(d) of title 10, United States Code,
10 in connection with performing duty specified in section
11 678(a) of title 10, United States Code, or while under-
12 going reserve training, or while performing drills or equiv-
13 alent duty or other duty, and for members of the Reserve
14 Officers' Training Corps, and expenses authorized by sec-
15 tion 2131 of title 10, United States Code, as authorized
16 by law; and for payments to the Department of Defense
17 Military Retirement Fund; \$2,143,272,000.

18 RESERVE PERSONNEL, NAVY

19 For pay, allowances, clothing, subsistence, gratuities,
20 travel, and related expenses for personnel of the Navy Re-
21 serve on active duty under section 265 of title 10, United
22 States Code, or while serving on active duty under section
23 672(d) of title 10, United States Code, in connection with
24 performing duty specified in section 678(a) of title 10,
25 United States Code, or while undergoing reserve training,

1 or while performing drills or equivalent duty, and for
2 members of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, and ex-
3 penses authorized by section 2131 of title 10, United
4 States Code, as authorized by law; and for payments to
5 the Department of Defense Military Retirement Fund;
6 \$1,565,838,000.

7 RESERVE PERSONNEL, MARINE CORPS

8 For pay, allowances, clothing, subsistence, gratuities,
9 travel, and related expenses for personnel of the Marine
10 Corps Reserve on active duty under section 265 of title
11 10, United States Code, or while serving on active duty
12 under section 672(d) of title 10, United States Code, in
13 connection with performing duty specified in section
14 678(a) of title 10, United States Code, or while under-
15 going reserve training, or while performing drills or equiv-
16 alent duty, and for members of the Marine Corps platoon
17 leaders class, and expenses authorized by section 2131 of
18 title 10, United States Code, as authorized by law; and
19 for payments to the Department of Defense Military Re-
20 tirement Fund; \$350,490,000.

21 RESERVE PERSONNEL, AIR FORCE

22 For pay, allowances, clothing, subsistence, gratuities,
23 travel, and related expenses for personnel of the Air Force
24 Reserve on active duty under sections 265, 8021, and
25 8038 of title 10, United States Code, or while serving on

1 active duty under section 672(d) of title 10, United States
2 Code, in connection with performing duty specified in sec-
3 tion 678(a) of title 10, United States Code, or while un-
4 dergoing reserve training, or while performing drills or
5 equivalent duty or other duty, and for members of the Air
6 Reserve Officers' Training Corps, and expenses authorized
7 by section 2131 of title 10, United States Code, as author-
8 ized by law; and for payments to the Department of De-
9 fense Military Retirement Fund; \$783,158,000.

10 NATIONAL GUARD PERSONNEL, ARMY

11 For pay, allowances, clothing, subsistence, gratuities,
12 travel, and related expenses for personnel of the Army Na-
13 tional Guard while on duty under section 265, 3021, or
14 3496 of title 10 or section 708 of title 32, United States
15 Code, or while serving on duty under section 672(d) of
16 title 10 or section 502(f) of title 32, United States Code,
17 in connection with performing duty specified in section
18 678(a) of title 10, United States Code, or while under-
19 going training, or while performing drills or equivalent
20 duty or other duty, and expenses authorized by section
21 2131 of title 10, United States Code, as authorized by
22 law; and for payments to the Department of Defense Mili-
23 tary Retirement Fund; \$3,334,183,000.

1 NATIONAL GUARD PERSONNEL, AIR FORCE

2 For pay, allowances, clothing, subsistence, gratuities,
3 travel, and related expenses for personnel of the Air Na-
4 tional Guard on duty under section 265, 8021, or 8496
5 of title 10 or section 708 of title 32, United States Code,
6 or while serving on duty under section 672(d) of title 10
7 or section 502(f) of title 32, United States Code, in con-
8 nection with performing duty specified in section 678(a)
9 of title 10, United States Code, or while undergoing train-
10 ing, or while performing drills or equivalent duty or other
11 duty, and expenses authorized by section 2131 of title 10,
12 United States Code, as authorized by law; and for pay-
13 ments to the Department of Defense Military Retirement
14 Fund; \$1,215,935,000.

15 TITLE II

16 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

17 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, ARMY

18 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

19 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
20 for the operation and maintenance of the Army, as author-
21 ized by law; and not to exceed \$14,437,000 can be used
22 for emergencies and extraordinary expenses, to be ex-
23 pended on the approval or authority of the Secretary of
24 the Army, and payments may be made on his certificate
25 of necessity for confidential military purposes;

1 \$15,221,091,000 and, in addition, \$880,200,000, to be de-
2 rived by transfer from the Defense Business Operations
3 Fund and \$150,000,000 shall be derived by transfer from
4 the National Defense Stockpile Transaction Fund: *Pro-*
5 *vided*, That \$450,000 shall be made available only for the
6 1994 Memorial Day Celebration and \$450,000 shall be
7 made available only for the 1994 Capitol Fourth Project.

8 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, NAVY

9 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

10 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
11 for the operation and maintenance of the Navy and the
12 Marine Corps, as authorized by law; and not to exceed
13 \$4,667,000 can be used for emergencies and extraordinary
14 expenses, to be expended on the approval or authority of
15 the Secretary of the Navy, and payments may be made
16 on his certificate of necessity for confidential military pur-
17 poses; \$18,097,782,000 and, in addition \$1,092,700,000,
18 to be derived by transfer from the Defense Business Oper-
19 ations Fund and \$150,000,000 shall be derived by trans-
20 fer from the National Defense Stockpile Transaction
21 Fund: *Provided*, That \$350,000 shall be available only to
22 connect residences located in the vicinity of the Naval Air
23 Warfare Center, Warminster, to the Warminster municipi-
24 pal water supply system.

1 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, MARINE CORPS
2 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

3 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
4 for the operation and maintenance of the Marine Corps,
5 as authorized by law; \$1,773,889,000 and, in addition,
6 \$121,000,000, to be derived by transfer from the Defense
7 Business Operations Fund.

8 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR FORCE
9 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

10 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
11 for the operation and maintenance of the Air Force, as
12 authorized by law; and not to exceed \$8,787,000 can be
13 used for emergencies and extraordinary expenses, to be ex-
14 pended on the approval or authority of the Secretary of
15 the Air Force, and payments may be made on his certifi-
16 cate of necessity for confidential military purposes;
17 \$18,305,447,000 and, in addition, \$941,400,000, to be de-
18 rived by transfer from the Defense Business Operations
19 Fund and \$200,000,000 shall be derived by transfer from
20 the National Defense Stockpile Transaction Fund: *Pro-*
21 *vided*, That \$15,500,000 shall only be used to operate,
22 maintain and enhance the Tactical Interim CAMS and
23 REMIS Reporting System (TICARRS-92): *Provided fur-*
24 *ther*, That TICARRS-92 be reestablished, with direct
25 maintenance data input, as the supporting system for at

1 least one wing each of F-15, F-16, and F-117A aircraft
2 by no later than February 1, 1994: *Provided further*, That
3 TICARRS-92 be reestablished, with direct maintenance
4 data input, as the supporting system for all F-15, F-16,
5 and F-117A aircraft by no later than April 1, 1994: *Pro-*
6 *vided further*, That none of the funds appropriated or oth-
7 erwise made available under this Act shall be used to oper-
8 ate, maintain or otherwise support an automated mainte-
9 nance management system for F-15, F-16, and F-117A
10 aircraft other than TICARRS-92 after April 1, 1994: *Pro-*
11 *vided further*, That of the funds appropriated under this
12 heading, not more than \$9,538,000 shall be available only
13 for a grant to the Women in Military Service For America
14 Memorial Foundation, Inc., to be used solely to perform
15 the repair, restoration, and preservation of the main gate
16 structures, center plaza, and Homicycle of the Arlington
17 National Cemetery. These funds shall be made available
18 solely for project costs and none of the funds are for remu-
19 neration of any entity or individual associated with fund
20 raising for the project: *Provided further*, That of the funds
21 appropriated under this heading, \$5,000,000 shall be
22 made available only for continued environmental restora-
23 tion of the former Olmsted Air Force Base, Pennsylvania.

1 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, DEFENSE-WIDE

2 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
3 for the operation and maintenance of activities and agen-
4 cies of the Department of Defense (other than the military
5 departments), as authorized by law; \$9,497,133,000, of
6 which not to exceed \$25,000,000 may be available for the
7 CINC initiative fund account; and of which not to exceed
8 \$19,422,000 can be used for emergencies and extraor-
9 dinary expenses, to be expended on the approval or author-
10 ity of the Secretary of Defense, and payments may be
11 made on his certificate of necessity for confidential mili-
12 tary purposes: *Provided*, That of the funds appropriated
13 by this paragraph, \$996,001,000 shall be made available
14 only for the Special Operations Command: *Provided fur-*
15 *ther*, That of the funds appropriated in this paragraph,
16 \$427,705,000 shall not be obligated or expended until au-
17 thorized by law.

18 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, ARMY RESERVE

19 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
20 for the operation and maintenance, including training, or-
21 ganization, and administration, of the Army Reserve; re-
22 pair of facilities and equipment; hire of passenger motor
23 vehicles; travel and transportation; care of the dead;
24 recruiting; procurement of services, supplies, and
25 equipment; and communications; \$1,115,095,000: *Pro-*

1 *vided*, That of the funds appropriated in this paragraph,
2 \$19,505,000 shall not be obligated or expended until au-
3 thorized by law.

4 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, NAVY RESERVE

5 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
6 for the operation and maintenance, including training, or-
7 ganization, and administration, of the Navy Reserve; re-
8 pair of facilities and equipment; hire of passenger motor
9 vehicles; travel and transportation; care of the dead; re-
10 cruiting; procurement of services, supplies, and equip-
11 ment; and communications; \$807,200,000: *Provided*, That
12 operational control of the Naval Reserve Personnel Center,
13 including its functions and responsibilities, shall be under
14 the command and control of the Commander, Naval Re-
15 serve Command: *Provided further*, That of the funds ap-
16 propriated in this paragraph, \$31,400,000 shall not be ob-
17 ligated or expended until authorized by law.

18 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, MARINE CORPS

19 RESERVE

20 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
21 for the operation and maintenance, including training, or-
22 ganization, and administration, of the Marine Corps Re-
23 serve; repair of facilities and equipment; hire of passenger
24 motor vehicles; travel and transportation; care of the dead;
25 recruiting; procurement of services, supplies, and equip-

1 ment; and communications; \$86,855,000: *Provided*, That
2 of the funds appropriated in this paragraph, \$11,805,000
3 shall not be obligated or expended until authorized by law.

4 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR FORCE RESERVE

5 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
6 for the operation and maintenance, including training, or-
7 ganization, and administration, of the Air Force Reserve;
8 repair of facilities and equipment; hire of passenger motor
9 vehicles; travel and transportation; care of the dead; re-
10 cruiting; procurement of services, supplies, and equip-
11 ment; and communications; \$1,370,222,000: *Provided*,
12 That of the funds appropriated in this paragraph,
13 \$15,644,000 shall not be obligated or expended until au-
14 thorized by law.

15 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, ARMY NATIONAL

16 GUARD

17 For expenses of training, organizing, and administer-
18 ing the Army National Guard, including medical and hos-
19 pital treatment and related expenses in non-Federal hos-
20 pitals; maintenance, operation, and repairs to structures
21 and facilities; hire of passenger motor vehicles; personnel
22 services in the National Guard Bureau; travel expenses
23 (other than mileage), as authorized by law for Army per-
24 sonnel on active duty, for Army National Guard division,
25 regimental, and battalion commanders while inspecting

1 units in compliance with National Guard Bureau regula-
2 tions when specifically authorized by the Chief, National
3 Guard Bureau; supplying and equipping the Army Na-
4 tional Guard as authorized by law; and expenses of repair,
5 modification, maintenance, and issue of supplies and
6 equipment (including aircraft); \$2,272,018,000: *Provided*,
7 That of the funds appropriated in this paragraph,
8 \$10,000,000 shall be available only for a National Guard
9 Outreach Program in the Los Angeles School District:
10 *Provided further*, That of the funds appropriated in this
11 paragraph, \$48,763,000 shall not be obligated or ex-
12 pended until authorized by law.

13 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR NATIONAL GUARD

14 For operation and maintenance of the Air National
15 Guard, including medical and hospital treatment and re-
16 lated expenses in non-Federal hospitals; maintenance, op-
17 eration, repair, and other necessary expenses of facilities
18 for the training and administration of the Air National
19 Guard, including repair of facilities, maintenance, oper-
20 ation, and modification of aircraft; transportation of
21 things; hire of passenger motor vehicles; supplies, mate-
22 rials, and equipment, as authorized by law for the Air Na-
23 tional Guard; and expenses incident to the maintenance
24 and use of supplies, materials, and equipment, including
25 such as may be furnished from stocks under the control

1 of agencies of the Department of Defense; travel expenses
2 (other than mileage) on the same basis as authorized by
3 law for Air National Guard personnel on active Federal
4 duty, for Air National Guard commanders while inspecting
5 units in compliance with National Guard Bureau regula-
6 tions when specifically authorized by the Chief, National
7 Guard Bureau; \$2,695,233,000: *Provided*, That of the
8 funds appropriated under this paragraph, \$3,000,000
9 shall be made available only for the operation of Air Na-
10 tional Guard C-130H operational support aircraft of the
11 159th Air National Guard Fighter Group and the 169th
12 Air National Guard Fighter Group: *Provided further*, That
13 of the funds appropriated in this paragraph, \$30,000,000
14 shall not be obligated or expended until authorized by law.

15 NATIONAL BOARD FOR THE PROMOTION OF RIFLE
16 PRACTICE, ARMY

17 For the necessary expenses and personnel services
18 (other than pay and non-travel-related allowances of mem-
19 bers of the Armed Forces of the United States, except for
20 members of the reserve components thereof called or or-
21 dered to active duty to provide support for the national
22 matches) in accordance with law, for operation and main-
23 tenance of rifle ranges; the instruction of citizens in
24 marksmanship; the promotion of rifle practice; the conduct
25 of the national matches; the sale of ammunition under the

1 authority of title 10, United States Code, sections 4308
2 and 4311; the travel of rifle teams, military personnel, and
3 individuals attending regional, national, and international
4 competitions; and the payment to competitors at national
5 matches under section 4312 of title 10, United States
6 Code, of subsistence and travel allowances under section
7 4313 of title 10, United States Code; not to exceed
8 \$2,483,000.

9 COURT OF MILITARY APPEALS, DEFENSE

10 For salaries and expenses necessary for the United
11 States Court of Military Appeals; \$5,855,000, of which
12 not to exceed \$2,500 can be used for official representa-
13 tion purposes: *Provided*, That of the funds appropriated
14 in this paragraph, \$245,000 shall not be obligated or ex-
15 pended until authorized by law.

16 ENVIRONMENTAL RESTORATION, DEFENSE

17 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

18 For the Department of Defense; \$1,716,800,000, to
19 remain available until transferred: *Provided*, That the Sec-
20 retary of Defense shall, upon determining that such funds
21 are required for environmental restoration, reduction and
22 recycling of hazardous waste, research and development
23 associated with hazardous wastes and removal of unsafe
24 buildings and debris of the Department of Defense, or for
25 similar purposes (including programs and operations at

1 sites formerly used by the Department of Defense), trans-
2 fer the funds made available by this appropriation to other
3 appropriations made available to the Department of De-
4 fense as the Secretary may designate, to be merged with
5 and to be available for the same purposes and for the same
6 time period as the appropriations of funds to which trans-
7 ferred: *Provided further*, That upon a determination that
8 all or part of the funds transferred from this appropriation
9 are not necessary for the purposes provided herein, such
10 amounts may be transferred back to this appropriation:
11 *Provided further*, That of the funds provided under this
12 heading, not less than \$200,000,000 shall be available
13 only for the expedited cleanup of environmentally contami-
14 nated sites and only in accordance with a comprehensive
15 plan submitted to Congress by the Secretary of Defense.

16 SUPPORT FOR INTERNATIONAL SPORTING

17 COMPETITIONS, DEFENSE

18 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

19 For expenses of logistical support (including security
20 planning and services) and personnel services provided by
21 the Department of Defense for the World University
22 Games, the 1996 Games of the XXVI Olympiad, and the
23 World Cup USA Organizing Committee, (other than pay
24 and nontravel related allowances of members of the Armed
25 Forces of the United States, except for members of the

1 Reserve components thereof called or ordered to active
2 duty to provide support for such international sporting
3 competitions), as authorized by law, provided by any com-
4 ponent of the Department of Defense to such sporting
5 competitions, \$6,000,000, of which not less than
6 \$2,000,000 shall be available only for the 1996 Games of
7 the XXVI Olympiad, to remain available until expended:
8 *Provided*, That unobligated balances of funds appropriated
9 in the Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 1992
10 (Public Law 102-172) under the headings “World Univer-
11 sity Games” and “Summer Olympics” and unobligated
12 balances of the funds appropriated in the Department of
13 Defense Appropriations Act, 1993, (Public Law 102-396)
14 under the headings “World University Games” and “Sum-
15 mer Olympics” and “World Cup USA 1994” in title II
16 of that Act shall, notwithstanding section 8003 of Public
17 Law 102-172 and section 9003 of Public Law 102-396,
18 upon the enactment of this Act, be transferred to this ap-
19 propriation, to be merged with and to be available for the
20 same purposes, and for the same time period, as this ap-
21 propriation: *Provided further*, That the funds so trans-
22 ferred from such Acts under the headings “Summer Olym-
23 pics” shall be available only for expenses for, or incurred
24 in anticipation of, the support provided, or to be provided,
25 to the 1996 Games of the XXVI Olympiad: *Provided fur-*

1 *ther*, That funds appropriated in this paragraph shall not
2 be obligated or expended until authorized by law.

3 HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

4 For transportation for humanitarian relief for the
5 people of Afghanistan and sub-Saharan Africa, acquisition
6 and shipment of transportation assets to assist in the dis-
7 tribution of such relief, and for transportation and dis-
8 tribution of humanitarian relief supplies, and excess non-
9 lethal property; \$15,000,000, to remain available for obli-
10 gation until September 30, 1995: *Provided*, That of the
11 funds appropriated in this paragraph, \$15,000,000 shall
12 not be obligated or expended until authorized by law.

13 GLOBAL COOPERATIVE INITIATIVES, DEFENSE-WIDE
14 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

15 For support of Department of Defense responses to
16 national and international natural disasters and the ex-
17 penses of other global disaster relief activities of the De-
18 partment of Defense; for acquisition, transportation, and
19 distribution of humanitarian relief supplies, including the
20 acquisition and shipment of transportation assets to assist
21 in the distribution of such humanitarian relief supplies;
22 and for Department of Defense expenses of participation
23 in, and support for, multilateral, international peacekeep-
24 ing and humanitarian efforts, including the provision of
25 military personnel, supplies, and services, under national

1 or international auspices, in connection with such efforts;
2 \$383,000,000, to remain available for transfer until Sep-
3 tember 30, 1995: *Provided*, That the Secretary of Defense
4 shall, upon determining that such funds are necessary to
5 carry out the purposes of this appropriation, transfer the
6 funds made available by this appropriation to other appro-
7 priations or funds available to the Department of Defense,
8 as the Secretary may designate, to be merged with, and
9 to be available for the same purposes and for the same
10 time period, as the appropriations or funds to which trans-
11 ferred: *Provided further*, That upon a determination that
12 all or part of the funds transferred from this appropriation
13 are not necessary for the purposes provided herein, such
14 amounts may be transferred back to this appropriation:
15 *Provided further*, That the transfer authority provided in

3 be obligated only for research designed to develop im-
4 proved performance from high performance computing
5 systems and technology utilizing parallel vector processing
6 architecture: *Provided further*, That not less than
7 \$20,000,000 of the funds appropriated in this paragraph
8 shall be available only for an Experimental Program to
9 Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCOR) in the De-
10 partment of Defense which shall include all States eligible
11 as of the date of enactment of this Act for the National
12 Science Foundation Experimental Program to Stimulate
13 Competitive Research: *Provided further*, That none of the
14 funds appropriated in this paragraph for research, devel-
15 opment, demonstration, or commercialization of electric
16 vehicles and the related infrastructure; fuel cell research;
17 natural gas research; or coal research, authorized to be
18 conducted by the Secretary of Energy under statutes ad-
19 ministered by such Secretary shall be obligated by the Sec-
20 retary of Defense except in accordance with the applicable
21 provisions of the Energy Policy Act of 1992 and other rel-
22 evant statutes and pursuant to an agreement, made avail-
23 able to the applicable legislative and appropriation Com-
24 mittees of Congress, between the Secretary of Defense and
25 the Secretary of Energy that provides for coordination of

1 all such activities with the relevant programs at the De-
2 partment of Energy administered under such Acts: *Pro-*
3 *vided further*, That of the funds appropriated under this
4 heading, not less than \$52,000,000 shall be made avail-
5 able only for the Computer-aided Acquisition and Logis-
6 tics Support (CALs) Shared Resource Center (CSRC)
7 program. Of that amount, not less than \$30,000,000 shall
8 be made available only for the continued operation of the
9 original CSRC by the current nonprofit institution or its
10 successor in interest, as the Department's tri-service
11 CALs standards and technologies development, deploy-
12 ment, training, and education hub for the CSRC program;
13 the continued operation of the CSRC Regional Satellite
14 (CRS); and the establishment and continued operation of
15 additional CRSs to be operated by educational or other
16 nonprofit institutions. In addition, \$20,000,000 shall be
17 made available only for the continued operation of the six
18 original CRSs: *Provided further*, That none of the funds
19 in this Act can be expended to pay the salaries or expenses
20 of the Department's CSRC Program Management Office
21 unless such office is located within the Office of the Sec-
22 retary of Defense: *Provided further*, That nothing shall
23 prohibit use of the CSRC or CRSs by industry, associa-
24 tions, other Department of Defense services and agencies,
25 and other government agencies for efforts to be separately

1 negotiated and funded: *Provided further*, That \$2,300,000
2 shall be made available only for cell adhesion molecule re-
3 search.

4 DEVELOPMENTAL TEST AND EVALUATION, DEFENSE

5 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, of inde-
6 pendent activities of the Director, Test and Evaluation in
7 the direction and supervision of developmental test and
8 evaluation, including performance and joint developmental
9 testing and evaluation; and administrative expenses in
10 connection therewith; \$232,592,000, to remain available
11 for obligation until September 30, 1995.

12 OPERATIONAL TEST AND EVALUATION, DEFENSE

13 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
14 for the independent activities of the Director, Operational
15 Test and Evaluation in the direction and supervision of
16 operational test and evaluation, including initial oper-
17 ational test and evaluation which is conducted prior to,
18 and in support of, production decisions; joint operational
19 testing and evaluation; and administrative expenses in
20 connection therewith; \$12,650,000, to remain available for
21 obligation until September 30, 1995.

1 TITLE V
2 REVOLVING AND MANAGEMENT FUNDS
3 DEFENSE BUSINESS OPERATIONS FUND
4 For the Defense Business Operations Fund;
5 \$1,091,100,000: *Provided*, That none of the funds avail-
6 able in the Defense Business Operations Fund shall be
7 used for any hardware procurement, new development, or
8 expansion of the Defense Business Management System;
9 except that funds may be used to continue minimal main-
10 tenance efforts of the Defense Business Management Sys-
11 tem for the Defense Logistics Agency to continue daily
12 operations.

13 NATIONAL DEFENSE SEALIFT FUND
14 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)
15 For National Defense Sealift Fund programs,
16 projects, and activities, \$490,800,000, to remain available
17 until expended: *Provided*, That up to \$200,000,000 shall
18 be available for transfer to the Secretary of Transpor-
19 tation for costs (as defined in section 502 of the Federal
20 Credit Reform Act of 1990) of loan guarantee commit-
21 ments under title XII of the Merchant Marine Act, 1936,
22 as amended by H.R. 2401, the National Defense Author-
23 ization Act for Fiscal Year 1994: *Provided further*, That
24 any facilities financed by the foregoing loan guarantee
25 commitments must make use of new technologies and

1 processes which have been demonstrated by Department
2 of Defense organizations prior to construction of facilities:
3 *Provided further*, That all loan guarantees or loan guaran-
4 tee commitments made by the Secretary of Transportation
5 shall occur only after consultation with the Secretary of
6 Defense: *Provided further*, That notwithstanding any other
7 provision of law, the Secretary of Transportation shall give
8 priority to providing loan guarantees to businesses located
9 in enterprise zones and investing private funds in develop-
10 ing integrated design and manufacturing facilities tech-
11 nologies: *Provided further*, That notwithstanding any other
12 provision of law, all loan guarantees or loan guarantee
13 commitments for ship construction shall be made without
14 regard to gross ton weight.

17 DEFENSE HEALTH PROGRAM

18 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, for medical
19 and health care programs of the Department of Defense,
20 as authorized by law; \$9,644,447,000, of which
21 \$9,368,185,000 shall be for Operation and maintenance,
22 of which \$276,262,000, to remain available for obligation
23 until September 30, 1996, shall be for Procurement: *Pro-*
24 *vided*, That the Department shall competitively contract
25 during fiscal year 1994 for mail service pharmacy for at

1 least two multi-state regions in addition to the ongoing
2 solicitations for Florida, South Carolina, Georgia, Dela-
3 ware, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Hawaii, as well as
4 each base closure area not supported by an at-risk man-
5 aged care plan; that such services shall be procured inde-
6 pendent of any other Department managed care contracts;
7 that one multi-state region shall include the State of Ken-
8 tucky: *Provided further*, That of the funds appropriated
9 in this Act, such funds as necessary shall be used for the
10 continuation of the cooperative program model being es-
11 tablished at Madigan Medical Center for severely behavior
12 disordered students: *Provided further*, That of the funds
13 appropriated in this paragraph, \$265,000,000 shall not be
14 obligated or expended until authorized by law.

15 CHEMICAL AGENTS AND MUNITIONS DESTRUCTION,
16 DEFENSE

17 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary
18 for the destruction of the United States stockpile of lethal
19 chemical agents and munitions in accordance with the pro-
20 visions of section 1412 of the Department of Defense Au-
21 thorization Act, 1986, (50 U.S.C. 1521) and for the de-
22 struction of other chemical warfare materials that are not
23 in the chemical weapon stockpile, \$397,561,000, of which
24 \$292,061,000 shall be for Operation and maintenance,
25 \$74,800,000, to remain available until September 30,

1 1996, shall be for Procurement, and \$30,700,000, to re-
2 main available until September 30, 1995, shall be for Re-
3 search, development, test and evaluation: *Provided*, That
4 of the funds appropriated in this paragraph, \$30,700,000
5 shall not be obligated or expended until authorized by law.

6 DRUG INTERDICTION AND COUNTER-DRUG ACTIVITIES,

7 DEFENSE

8 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

9 For drug interdiction and counter-drug activities of
10 the Department of Defense, for transfer to appropriations
11 available to the Department of Defense for military per-
12 sonnel of the reserve components serving under the provi-
13 sions of title 10 and title 32, United States Code; for Op-
14 eration and maintenance; for Procurement; and for Re-
15 search, development, test and evaluation; \$757,785,000:
16 *Provided*, That the funds appropriated by this paragraph
17 shall be available for obligation for the same time period
18 and for the same purpose as the appropriation to which
19 transferred: *Provided further*, That the transfer authority
20 provided in this paragraph is in addition to any transfer
21 authority contained elsewhere in this Act: *Provided fur-*
22 *ther*, That of the funds appropriated in this paragraph,
23 not less than \$5,900,000 shall be available only for the
24 Gulf States Counter-Narcotics Initiative.

1 OFFICE OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL

2 For expenses and activities of the Office of the
3 Inspector General in carrying out the provisions of the
4 Inspector General Act of 1978, as amended;
5 \$169,801,000, of which \$169,001,000 shall be for Oper-
6 ation and maintenance, of which not to exceed \$400,000
7 is available for emergencies and extraordinary expenses to
8 be expended on the approval or authority of the Inspector
9 General, and payments may be made on his certificate of
10 necessity for confidential military purposes; and of which
11 \$800,000, to remain available until September 30, 1996,
12 shall be for Procurement.

13 TITLE VII

14 RELATED AGENCIES

15 NATIONAL FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE PROGRAM

16 CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY RETIREMENT AND

17 DISABILITY SYSTEM FUND

18 For payment to the Central Intelligence Agency Re-
19 tirement and Disability System Fund, to maintain proper
20 funding level for continuing the operation of the Central
21 Intelligence Agency Retirement and Disability System;
22 \$182,300,000.

1 NATIONAL SECURITY EDUCATION TRUST FUND

2 (RESCISSION)

3 Of the funds made available in Public Law 103-50
4 for the National Security Education Act under the head-
5 ing “National Security Education Trust Fund”,
6 \$10,000,000 is hereby rescinded.

7 Of the funds made available in Public Law 102-172
8 for the National Security Education Trust Fund,
9 \$140,000,000 and interest earned and accrued thereon is
10 hereby rescinded.

11 COMMUNITY MANAGEMENT STAFF

12 For necessary expenses of the Community Manage-
13 ment Staff; \$114,688,000.

14 TITLE VIII

15 GENERAL PROVISIONS

16 SEC. 8001. No part of any appropriation contained
17 in this Act shall be used for publicity or propaganda pur-
18 poses not authorized by the Congress.

19 SEC. 8002. During the current fiscal year, provisions
20 of law prohibiting the payment of compensation to, or em-
21 ployment of, any person not a citizen of the United States
22 shall not apply to personnel of the Department of Defense:
23 *Provided*, That salary increases granted to direct and indi-
24 rect hire foreign national employees of the Department of
25 Defense funded by this Act shall not be at a rate in excess

1 of the percentage increase authorized by law for civilian
2 employees of the Department of Defense whose pay is
3 computed under the provisions of section 5332 of title 5,
4 United States Code, or at a rate in excess of the percent-
5 age increase provided by the appropriate host nation to
6 its own employees, whichever is higher: *Provided further,*
7 That this section shall not apply to Department of De-
8 fense foreign service national employees serving at United
9 States diplomatic missions whose pay is set by the Depart-
10 ment of State under the Foreign Service Act of 1980.

11 SEC. 8003. No part of any appropriation contained
12 in this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond
13 the current fiscal year, unless expressly so provided herein.

14 SEC. 8004. No more than 20 per centum of the ap-
15 propriations in this Act which are limited for obligation
16 during the current fiscal year shall be obligated during
17 the last two months of the fiscal year: *Provided,* That this
18 section shall not apply to obligations for support of active
19 duty training of reserve components or summer camp
20 training of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, or the
21 National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, Army.

22 SEC. 8005. Section 9005 of the Department of De-
23 fense Appropriations Act, 1993 (Public Law 102-396) is
24 amended by striking out "contained in this Act" and in-

1 serting “or any other funds available to the Department
2 of Defense” in lieu thereof.

3 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

4 SEC. 8006. Upon determination by the Secretary of
5 Defense that such action is necessary in the national inter-
6 est, he may, with the approval of the Office of Manage-
7 ment and Budget, transfer not to exceed \$2,000,000,000
8 of working capital funds of the Department of Defense
9 or funds made available in this Act to the Department
10 of Defense for military functions (except military con-
11 struction) between such appropriations or funds or any
12 subdivision thereof, to be merged with and to be available
13 for the same purposes, and for the same time period, as
14 the appropriation or fund to which transferred: *Provided*,
15 That such authority to transfer may not be used unless
16 for higher priority items, based on unforeseen military re-
17 quirements, than those for which originally appropriated
18 and in no case where the item for which funds are re-
19 quested has been denied by Congress: *Provided further*,
20 That the Secretary of Defense shall notify the Congress
21 promptly of all transfers made pursuant to this authority
22 or any other authority in this Act.

23 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

24 SEC. 8007. During the current fiscal year, cash bal-
25 ances in working capital funds of the Department of De-
26 fense established pursuant to section 2208 of title 10,

1 United States Code, may be maintained in only such
2 amounts as are necessary at any time for cash disburse-
3 ments to be made from such funds: *Provided*, That trans-
4 fers may be made between such funds and the “Foreign
5 Currency Fluctuations, Defense” and “Operation and
6 Maintenance” appropriation accounts in such amounts as
7 may be determined by the Secretary of Defense, with the
8 approval of the Office of Management and Budget, except
9 that such transfers may not be made unless the Secretary
10 of Defense has notified the Congress of the proposed
11 transfer. Except in amounts equal to the amounts appro-
12 priated to working capital funds in this Act, no obligations
13 may be made against a working capital fund to procure
14 or increase the value of war reserve material inventory,
15 unless the Secretary of Defense has notified the Congress
16 prior to any such obligation.

17 SEC. 8008. Using funds available by this Act or any
18 other Act, the Secretary of the Air Force, pursuant to a
19 determination under section 2690 of title 10, United
20 States Code, may implement cost-effective agreements for
21 required heating facility modernization in the
22 Kaiserslautern Military Community in the Federal Repub-
23 lic of Germany: *Provided*, That in the City of
24 Kaiserslautern such agreements will include the use of
25 United States anthracite as the base load energy for mu-

1 nicipal district heat to the United States Defense installa-
2 tions: *Provided further*, That at Landstuhl Army Regional
3 Medical Center and Ramstein Air Base, furnished heat
4 may be obtained from private, regional or municipal serv-
5 ices, if provisions are included for the consideration of
6 United States coal as an energy source.

7 SEC. 8009. Funds appropriated by this Act may not
8 be used to initiate a special access program without prior
9 notification 30 calendar days in session in advance to the
10 Committees on Appropriations and Armed Services of the
11 Senate and House of Representatives.

12 SEC. 8010. None of the funds contained in this Act
13 available for the Civilian Health and Medical Program of
14 the Uniformed Services shall be available for payments to
15 physicians and other authorized individual health care pro-
16 viders in excess of the amounts allowed in fiscal year 1993
17 for similar services, except that: (a) for services for which
18 the Secretary of Defense determines an increase is justi-
19 fied by economic circumstances, the allowable amounts
20 may be increased in accordance with appropriate economic
21 index data similar to that used pursuant to title XVIII
22 of the Social Security Act; and (b) for services the Sec-
23 retary determines are overpriced based on allowable pay-
24 ments under title XVIII of the Social Security Act, the
25 allowable amounts shall be reduced by not more than 15

1 percent (except that the reduction may be waived if the
2 Secretary determines that it would impair adequate access
3 to health care services for beneficiaries). The Secretary
4 shall solicit public comment prior to promulgating regula-
5 tions to implement this section. Such regulations shall in-
6 clude a limitation, similar to that used under title XVIII
7 of the Social Security Act, on the extent to which a pro-
8 vider may bill a beneficiary an actual charge in excess of
9 the allowable amount.

10 SEC. 8011. None of the funds provided in this Act
11 shall be available to initiate (1) a multiyear contract that
12 employs economic order quantity procurement in excess of
13 \$20,000,000 in any one year of the contract or that in-
14 cludes an unfunded contingent liability in excess of
15 \$20,000,000, or (2) a contract for advance procurement
16 leading to a multiyear contract that employs economic
17 order quantity procurement in excess of \$20,000,000 in
18 any one year, unless the Committees on Appropriations
19 and Armed Services of the Senate and House of Rep-
20 resentatives have been notified at least thirty days in ad-
21 vance of the proposed contract award: *Provided*, That no
22 part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be
23 available to initiate a multiyear contract for which the eco-
24 nomic order quantity advance procurement is not funded
25 at least to the limits of the Government's liability: *Pro-*

1 *vided further*, That no part of any appropriation contained
2 in this Act shall be available to initiate multiyear procure-
3 ment contracts for any systems or component thereof if
4 the value of the multiyear contract would exceed
5 \$500,000,000 unless specifically provided in this Act: *Pro-*
6 *vided further*, That no multiyear procurement contract can
7 be terminated without 10-day prior notification to the
8 Committees on Appropriations and Armed Services of the
9 House of Representatives and the Senate: *Provided fur-*
10 *ther*, That the execution of multiyear authority shall re-
11 quire the use of a present value analysis to determine low-
12 est cost compared to an annual procurement.

13 SEC. 8012. (a) None of the funds appropriated by
14 this Act shall be available to convert a position in support
15 of the Army Reserve, Air Force Reserve, Army National
16 Guard, and Air National Guard occupied by, or pro-
17 grammed to be occupied by, a (civilian) military technician
18 to a position to be held by a person in an active duty sta-
19 tus or active Guard or Reserve status if that conversion
20 would reduce the total number of positions occupied by,
21 or programmed to be occupied by, (civilian) military tech-
22 nicians of the component concerned, below 69,061: *Pro-*
23 *vided*, That none of the funds appropriated by this Act
24 shall be available to support more than 46,111 positions
25 in support of the Army Reserve, Army National Guard,

1 or Air National Guard occupied by, or programmed to be
2 occupied by, persons in an active Guard or Reserve status:
3 *Provided further*, That none of the funds appropriated by
4 this Act may be used to include (civilian) military techni-
5 cians in computing civilian personnel ceilings, including
6 statutory or administratively imposed ceilings, on activi-
7 ties in support of the Army Reserve, Air Force Reserve,
8 Army National Guard, or Air National Guard.

9 (b) None of the funds appropriated by this Act shall
10 be used to include (civilian) military technicians in any
11 administratively imposed freeze on civilian positions.

12 SEC. 8013. Notwithstanding any other provision of
13 law, governments of Indian tribes shall be treated as State
14 and local governments for the purposes of disposition of
15 real property recommended for closure in the report of the
16 Defense Secretary's Commission on Base Realignments
17 and Closures, December 1988, the report to the President
18 from the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commis-
19 sion, July 1991, and Public Law 100-526.

20 SEC. 8014. (a) The provisions of section 115(a)(4)
21 of title 10, United States Code, shall not apply with re-
22 spect to fiscal year 1994 or with respect to the appropria-
23 tion of funds for that year.

24 (b) During fiscal year 1994, the civilian personnel of
25 the Department of Defense may not be managed on the

1 basis of any end-strength, and the management of such
2 personnel during that fiscal year shall not be subject to
3 any constraint or limitation (known as an end-strength)
4 on the number of such personnel who may be employed
5 on the last day of such fiscal year.

6 (c) The fiscal year 1995 budget request for the De-
7 partment of Defense as well as all justification material
8 and other documentation supporting the fiscal year 1995
9 Department of Defense budget request shall be prepared
10 and submitted to the Congress as if subsections (a) and
11 (b) of this provision were effective with regard to fiscal
12 year 1995.

13 SEC. 8015. None of the funds made available by this
14 Act shall be used in any way, directly or indirectly, to in-
15 fluence congressional action on any legislation or appro-
16 priation matters pending before the Congress.

17 SEC. 8016. None of the funds appropriated by this
18 Act shall be obligated for the pay of any individual who
19 is initially employed after the date of enactment of this
20 Act as a technician in the administration and training of
21 the Army Reserve and the maintenance and repair of sup-
22 plies issued to the Army Reserve unless such individual
23 is also a military member of the Army Reserve troop pro-
24 gram unit that he or she is employed to support. Those
25 technicians employed by the Army Reserve in areas other

1 than Army Reserve troop program units need only be
2 members of the Selected Reserve.

3 SEC. 8017. None of the funds available to the De-
4 partment of Defense may be used for the floating storage
5 of petroleum or petroleum products except in vessels of
6 or belonging to the United States.

7 SEC. 8018. Notwithstanding any other provision of
8 law, the Secretaries of the Army and Air Force may au-
9 thorize the retention in an active status until age sixty
10 of any officer who would otherwise be removed from an
11 active status and who is employed as a National Guard
12 or Reserve technician in a position in which active status
13 in a reserve component of the Army or Air Force is re-
14 quired as a condition of that employment.

15 SEC. 8019. Notwithstanding any other provision of
16 law, proceeds from the investment of the Fisher House
17 Investment Trust Fund will be used to support the oper-
18 ation and maintenance of Fisher Houses associated with
19 Army medical treatment facilities.

20 SEC. 8020. (a) None of the funds appropriated by
21 this Act shall be used to make contributions to the Depart-
22 ment of Defense Education Benefits Fund pursuant to
23 section 2006(g) of title 10, United States Code, represent-
24 ing the normal cost for future benefits under section
25 1415(c) of title 38, United States Code, for any member

1 of the armed services who, on or after the date of enact-
2 ment of this Act—

3 (1) enlists in the armed services for a period of
4 active duty of less than three years; or

5 (2) receives an enlistment bonus under section
6 308a or 308f of title 37, United States Code,

7 nor shall any amounts representing the normal cost of
8 such future benefits be transferred from the Fund by the
9 Secretary of the Treasury to the Secretary of Veterans
10 Affairs pursuant to section 2006(d) of title 10, United
11 States Code; nor shall the Secretary of Veterans Affairs
12 pay such benefits to any such member: *Provided*, That,
13 in the case of a member covered by clause (1), these limi-
14 tations shall not apply to members in combat arms skills
15 or to members who enlist in the armed services on or after
16 July 1, 1989, under a program continued or established
17 by the Secretary of Defense in fiscal year 1991 to test
18 the cost-effective use of special recruiting incentives in-
19 volving not more than nineteen noncombat arms skills ap-
20 proved in advance by the Secretary of Defense: *Provided*
21 *further*, That this subsection applies only to active compo-
22 nents of the Army.

23 (b) None of the funds appropriated by this Act shall
24 be available for the basic pay and allowances of any mem-
25 ber of the Army participating as a full-time student and

1 receiving benefits paid by the Secretary of Veterans Af-
2 fairs from the Department of Defense Education Benefits
3 Fund when time spent as a full-time student is credited
4 toward completion of a service commitment: *Provided,*
5 That this subsection shall not apply to those members who
6 have reenlisted with this option prior to October 1, 1987:
7 *Provided further,* That this subsection applies only to ac-
8 tive components of the Army.

9 SEC. 8021. Funds appropriated in this Act shall be
10 available for the payment of not more than 75 percent
11 of the charges of a postsecondary educational institution
12 for the tuition or expenses of an officer in the Ready Re-
13 serve of the Army National Guard or Army Reserve for
14 education or training during his off-duty periods, except
15 that no part of the charges may be paid unless the officer
16 agrees to remain a member of the Ready Reserve for at
17 least four years after completion of such training or edu-
18 cation.

19 SEC. 8022. None of the funds appropriated by this
20 Act shall be available to convert to contractor performance
21 an activity or function of the Department of Defense that,
22 on or after the date of enactment of this Act, is performed
23 by more than ten Department of Defense civilian employ-
24 ees until a most efficient and cost-effective organization
25 analysis is completed on such activity or function and cer-

1 tification of the analysis is made to the Committees on
2 Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the
3 Senate: *Provided*, That this section shall not apply to a
4 commercial or industrial type function of the Department
5 of Defense that: (1) is included on the procurement list
6 established pursuant to section 2 of the Act of June 25,
7 1938 (41 U.S.C. 47), popularly referred to as the Javits-
8 Wagner-O'Day Act; (2) is planned to be converted to per-
9 formance by a qualified nonprofit agency for the blind or
10 by a qualified nonprofit agency for other severely handi-
11 capped individuals in accordance with that Act; or (3) is
12 planned to be converted to performance by a qualified firm
13 under 51 percent Native American ownership.

14 SEC. 8023. None of the funds appropriated or made
15 available by this Act may be obligated for acquisition of
16 major automated information systems which have not suc-
17 cessfully completed oversight reviews required by Defense
18 Department regulations: *Provided*, That the automated in-
19 formation systems oversight review board will be inde-
20 pendent of any other Department review function and
21 chaired by the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Command,
22 Control, Communications and Intelligence): *Provided fur-*
23 *ther*, That except for those programs to modernize and de-
24 velop migration and standard automated information sys-
25 tems that have been certified by the Department's senior

1 information resource management (IRM) official as being
2 fully compliant with the Department's information man-
3 agement initiative as defined in Defense Department Di-
4 rective 8000.1, no funds may be expended for moderniza-
5 tion or development of any automated information system
6 (AIS) by the military departments, services, defense agen-
7 cies, Joint Staff or Military Commands in excess of
8 \$1,000,000 unless the senior official of the Office of the
9 Secretary of Defense with primary responsibility for the
10 functions being supported or to be supported certifies to
11 the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Command, Control,
12 Communications and Intelligence that the functional
13 requirement(s) is valid and that the system modernization
14 or development has no unnecessary duplication of other
15 available or planned AISs: *Provided further*, That the De-
16 partment shall develop the capability for open systems in-
17 tegration of commercial-off-the-shelf (COTS) applications
18 within the Composite Health Care System (CHCS): *Pro-*
19 *vided further*, That the Department shall limit deployment
20 of the Defense Blood Standard System (DBSS) to donor
21 and processing centers, and shall procure, install, and in-
22 tegrate by April 1, 1994, at two or more CHCS sites an
23 open system compliant COTS hospital-based blood bank/
24 transfusion application, with security access by application
25 function and developed in the same application language

1 as CHCS: *Provided further*, That the Department shall
2 procure and install at all CHCS alpha and beta sites by
3 April 1, 1994, an open system integrated anatomic pathol-
4 ogy COTS application with security access by application
5 function and developed with the same software application
6 language as CHCS: *Provided further*, That notwithstand-
7 ing any other provision of law, the one time investment
8 cost, including the procurement or lease of new or
9 reutilized automatic data processing investment equip-
10 ment, peripheral equipment and related software, for the
11 July 16, 1993 DOD Data Center Consolidation Plan shall
12 not exceed \$309,000,000.

13 SEC. 8024. Notwithstanding any other provision of
14 law, the Secretary of the Navy may use funds appro-
15 priated to charter ships to be used as auxiliary mine-
16 sweepers providing that the owner agrees that these ships
17 may be activated as Navy Reserve ships with Navy Re-
18 serve crews used in training exercises conducted in accord-
19 ance with law and policies governing Naval Reserve forces:
20 *Provided*, That none of the funds appropriated or made
21 available in this Act may be used to inactivate, disestab-
22 lish, or discontinue the Navy's Craft of Opportunity Pro-
23 gram.

24 SEC. 8025. Notwithstanding any other provision of
25 law, the Department shall competitively award contracts

1 in fiscal year 1994 for at least four new region-wide, at-
2 risk, fixed price managed care support contracts consist-
3 ent with the following requirements: (1) each contract or
4 acquisition shall reflect the major features of the
5 CHAMPUS Reform Initiative and include provision for
6 the commanders of major military medical centers to par-
7 ticipate as the regional lead agents; (2) each such contract
8 or acquisition shall include a triple option benefit; (3) one
9 similar contract or acquisition shall cover the State of
10 Florida (which may include Department of Veterans Af-
11 fairs' medical facilities with the concurrence of the Sec-
12 retary of Veterans Affairs); (4) one similar contract shall
13 cover the States of Washington and Oregon; (5) each
14 other such contract or acquisition shall include at least
15 one complete State; (6) the managed care support con-
16 tracts for California and Hawaii, Florida, Washington and
17 Oregon shall not be counted for purposes of the required
18 four new contracts of acquisitions; and (7) the Depart-
19 ment shall modify a currently operating CHAMPUS serv-
20 ice contract to include an at-risk managed health care pro-
21 vision, to provide services not later than 90 days after en-
22 actment of this Act, in the area of Homestead Air Force
23 Base, to include the Homestead and South Miami Hos-
24 pitals as institutional providers, with a benefit structure
25 substantially identical to that established in fiscal year

1 1993 for the Carswell, Bergstrom and England Air Force
2 Bases (including a retail pharmacy network available to
3 Medicare-eligible beneficiaries), said provision to remain
4 effective as an interim measure until implementation of
5 the competitive at-risk contract for Florida as required by
6 this section: *Provided further*, That none of the funds ap-
7 propriated, or otherwise made available to the Department
8 of Defense, by this or any other Act of Congress, shall
9 be used to implement or administer any changes to the
10 operating CHAMPUS Reform Initiative-like contracts un-
11 less the scope of benefits and program management struc-
12 ture are consistent with the basic CHAMPUS Reform Ini-
13 tiative design in operation on January 1, 1993: *Provided*
14 *further*, That any law or regulation of a State or local gov-
15 ernment relating to health insurance, prepaid health
16 plans, or other health care delivery, administration, and
17 financing methods shall be preempted and shall not apply
18 to any contract entered into pursuant to chapter 55 of
19 title 10, United States Code: *Provided further*, That any
20 requirements for the certification of cost effectiveness, ac-
21 cess and quality of any managed health care programs will
22 be construed to require that the certification compare on
23 a national basis the program to be certified with the stand-
24 ard CHAMPUS program as determined by the application
25 of sound actuarial principles: *Provided further*, That the

1 Department shall competitively award at least two con-
2 tracts in fiscal year 1994 for stand-alone, at-risk managed
3 mental health services in high utilization, high-cost areas,
4 consistent with the management and service delivery fea-
5 tures in operation in the Contracted Provider Arrange-
6 ment (CPA) Tidewater Demonstration.

7 SEC. 8026. Funds appropriated or made available in
8 this Act shall be obligated and expended to continue to
9 fully utilize the facilities at the United States Army Engi-
10 neer's Waterways Experiment Station, including the con-
11 tinued availability of the supercomputer capability: *Pro-*
12 *vided*, That none of the funds in this Act may be used
13 to purchase any supercomputer which is not manufactured
14 in the United States, unless the Secretary of Defense cer-
15 tifies to the Armed Services and Appropriations Commit-
16 tees of Congress that such an acquisition must be made
17 in order to acquire capability for national security pur-
18 poses that is not available from United States manufactur-
19 ers.

20 SEC. 8027. For the purposes of the Balanced Budget
21 and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (Public Law
22 99-177) as amended by the Balanced Budget and Emer-
23 gency Deficit Control Reaffirmation Act of 1987 (Public
24 Law 100-119) and by the Budget Enforcement Act of
25 1990 (Public Law 101-508), the term program, project,

1 and activity for appropriations contained in this Act shall
2 be defined as the most specific level of budget items identi-
3 fied in the Department of Defense Appropriations Act,
4 1994, the accompanying House and Senate Committee re-
5 ports, the conference report and accompanying joint ex-
6 planatory statement of the managers of the Committee of
7 Conference, the related classified annexes and reports, and
8 the P-1 and R-1 budget justification documents as subse-
9 quently modified by Congressional action: *Provided*, That
10 the following exception to the above definition shall apply:

11 For the Military Personnel and the Operation and
12 Maintenance accounts, the term “program, project, and
13 activity” is defined as the appropriations accounts con-
14 tained in the Department of Defense Appropriations Act:
15 *Provided further*, That at the time the President submits
16 his budget for fiscal year 1995, the Department of De-
17 fense shall transmit to the Committees on Appropriations
18 and the Committees on Armed Services of the Senate and
19 the House of Representatives a budget justification docu-
20 ment to be known as the “O-1” which shall identify, at
21 the budget activity, activity group, and subactivity group
22 level, the amounts requested by the President to be appro-
23 priated to the Department of Defense for operation and
24 maintenance in any budget request, or amended budget
25 request, for fiscal year 1995.

1 SEC. 8028. Of the funds appropriated to the Army,
2 \$217,600,000 shall be available only for the Reserve Com-
3 ponent Automation System (RCAS): *Provided*, That none
4 of these funds can be expended—

5 (1) except as approved by the Chief of the Na-
6 tional Guard Bureau;

7 (2) unless RCAS resource management func-
8 tions are performed by the National Guard Bureau;

9 (3) to pay the salary of an RCAS program
10 manager who has not been selected and approved by
11 the Chief of the National Guard Bureau and char-
12 tered by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau
13 and the Secretary of the Army;

14 (4) unless the Program Manager (PM) charter
15 makes the PM accountable to the Chief of the Na-
16 tional Guard Bureau and fully defines his authority,
17 responsibility, reporting channels and organizational
18 structure;

19 (5) to pay the salaries of individuals assigned to
20 the RCAS program management office unless such
21 organization is comprised of personnel chosen jointly
22 by the Chiefs of the National Guard Bureau and the
23 Army Reserve;

24 (6) to pay contracted costs for the acquisition
25 of RCAS unless RCAS is an integrated system con-

1 sisting of software, hardware, and communications
2 equipment and unless such contract continues to
3 preclude the use of Government furnished equip-
4 ment, operating systems, and executive and applica-
5 tions software; and

6 (7) unless RCAS performs its own classified in-
7 formation processing: *Provided further*, That not-
8 withstanding any other provision of law, none of the
9 funds appropriated shall be available for procure-
10 ment of computers for the Army Reserve Component
11 which are used to network or expand the capabilities
12 of existing or future information systems or dupli-
13 cate functions to be provided under the RCAS con-
14 tract unless the procurement meets the following cri-
15 teria: (A) only RCAS automated data processing
16 (ADP) equipment may be procured and only in the
17 numbers and types allocated by the RCAS program
18 to each site; (B) the requesting organizational ele-
19 ment has no computer for stand-alone office auto-
20 mation usage; (C) replacement equipment will not
21 exceed the minimum required to maintain the reli-
22 ability of existing capabilities; (D) replacements will
23 be justified solely on the cost and feasibility of re-
24 pairs and maintenance of present ADP equipment as
25 compared to the cost of replacement; and (E) the

1 procurement is recommended by both the Chief of
2 the respective Reserve Component and the Chief of
3 the National Guard Bureau, and approved by the
4 Functional Proponent in the Department of De-
5 fense.

6 SEC. 8029. None of the funds in this Act may be
7 available for the purchase by the Department of Defense
8 (and its departments and agencies) of welded shipboard
9 anchor and mooring chain 4 inches in diameter and under
10 unless the anchor and mooring chain are manufactured
11 in the United States from components which are substan-
12 tially manufactured in the United States: *Provided*, That
13 for the purpose of this section manufactured will include
14 cutting, heat treating, quality control, testing of chain and
15 welding (including the forging and shot blasting process):
16 *Provided further*, That for the purpose of this section sub-
17 stantially all of the components of anchor and mooring
18 chain shall be considered to be produced or manufactured
19 in the United States if the aggregate cost of the compo-
20 nents produced or manufactured in the United States ex-
21 ceeds the aggregate cost of the components produced or
22 manufactured outside the United States: *Provided further*,
23 That when adequate domestic supplies are not available
24 to meet Department of Defense requirements on a timely
25 basis, the Secretary of the service responsible for the pro-

1 curement may waive this restriction on a case-by-case
2 basis by certifying in writing to the Committees on Appro-
3 priations that such an acquisition must be made in order
4 to acquire capability for national security purposes.

5 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

6 SEC. 8030. Notwithstanding any other provision of
7 law, the Department of Defense may transfer prior year,
8 unobligated balances and funds appropriated in this Act
9 to the operation and maintenance appropriations for the
10 purpose of providing military technician and Department
11 of Defense medical personnel pay and medical programs
12 (including CHAMPUS) the same exemption from seques-
13 tration set forth in the Balanced Budget and Emergency
14 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (Public Law 99-177) as
15 amended by the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit
16 Control Reaffirmation Act of 1987 (Public Law 100-119)
17 and by the Budget Enforcement Act of 1990 (Public Law
18 101-508) as that granted the other military personnel ac-
19 counts: *Provided*, That any transfer made pursuant to any
20 use of the authority provided by this provision shall be
21 limited so that the amounts reprogrammed to the oper-
22 ation and maintenance appropriations do not exceed the
23 amounts sequestered under the Balanced Budget and
24 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (Public Law 99-
25 177) as amended by the Balanced Budget and Emergency
26 Deficit Control Reaffirmation Act of 1987 (Public Law

1 100–119) and by the Budget Enforcement Act of 1990
2 (Public Law 101–508): *Provided further*, That the author-
3 ity to make transfers pursuant to this section is in addi-
4 tion to the authority to make transfers under other provi-
5 sions of this Act: *Provided further*, That the Secretary of
6 Defense may proceed with such transfer after notifying
7 the Appropriations Committees of the House of Rep-
8 resentatives and the Senate twenty calendar days in ses-
9 sion before any such transfer of funds under this
10 provision.

11 SEC. 8031. None of the funds appropriated by this
12 Act available for the Civilian Health and Medical Program
13 of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS) shall be available
14 for the reimbursement of any health care provider for in-
15 patient mental health service for care received when a pa-
16 tient is referred to a provider of inpatient mental health
17 care or residential treatment care by a medical or health
18 care professional having an economic interest in the facil-
19 ity to which the patient is referred: *Provided*, That this
20 limitation does not apply in the case of inpatient mental
21 health services provided under the program for the handi-
22 capped under subsection (d) of section 1079 of title 10,
23 United States Code, provided as partial hospital care, or
24 provided pursuant to a waiver authorized by the Secretary
25 of Defense because of medical or psychological cir-

1 cumstances of the patient that are confirmed by a health
2 professional who is not a Federal employee after a review,
3 pursuant to rules prescribed by the Secretary, which takes
4 into account the appropriate level of care for the patient,
5 the intensity of services required by the patient, and the
6 availability of that care.

7 SEC. 8032. All new Department of Defense procure-
8 ments shall separately identify software costs in the work
9 breakdown structure defined by MIL-STD-881 in those
10 instances where software is considered to be a major cat-
11 egory of cost.

12 SEC. 8033. During the current fiscal year and there-
13 after, of the funds appropriated, reimbursable expenses in-
14 curred by the Department of Defense on behalf of the So-
15 viet Union or its successor entities in monitoring United
16 States implementation of the Treaty Between the United
17 States of America and the Union of Soviet Socialist Re-
18 publics on the Elimination of Their Intermediate-Range
19 or Shorter-Range Missiles (“INF Treaty”), concluded De-
20 cember 8, 1987, may be treated as orders received and
21 obligation authority for the applicable appropriation, ac-
22 count, or fund increased accordingly. Likewise, any reim-
23 bursements received for such costs may be credited to the
24 same appropriation, account, or fund to which the ex-
25 penses were charged: *Provided*, That reimbursements

1 which are not received within one hundred and eighty days
2 after submission of an appropriate request for payment
3 shall be subject to interest at the current rate established
4 pursuant to section 2(b)(1)(B) of the Export-Import Bank
5 Act of 1945 (59 Stat. 526). Interest shall begin to accrue
6 on the one hundred and eighty-first day following submis-
7 sion of an appropriate request for payment: *Provided fur-*
8 *ther*, That funds appropriated in this Act may be used to
9 reimburse United States military personnel for reasonable
10 costs of subsistence, at rates to be determined by the Sec-
11 retary of Defense, incurred while accompanying Soviet In-
12 spection Team members or inspection team members of
13 the successor entities of the Soviet Union engaged in ac-
14 tivities related to the INF Treaty: *Provided further*, That
15 this provision includes only the in-country period (referred
16 to in the INF Treaty) and is effective whether such duty
17 is performed at, near, or away from an individual's perma-
18 nent duty station.

19 SEC. 8034. Funds available in this Act may be used
20 to provide transportation for the next-of-kin of individuals
21 who have been prisoners of war or missing in action from
22 the Vietnam era to an annual meeting in the United
23 States, under such regulations as the Secretary of Defense
24 may prescribe.

1 SEC. 8035. None of the funds available in this Act
2 to the Department of Defense or Navy shall be obligated
3 or expended for (or to implement) automatic data process-
4 ing, data processing center, central design activity, DMRD
5 918, defense information infrastructure, military or civil-
6 ian personnel and finance and accounting function consoli-
7 dation plans, consolidations, and disestablishment or re-
8 alignment plans that impact, in terms of reductions in
9 force or transfers in military and civilian personnel, end
10 strength, billets, functions, or missions, the Enlisted Per-
11 sonnel Management Center, the Naval Computer and
12 Telecommunications Station and Defense Accounting Of-
13 fice, New Orleans, and the Naval Reserve Personnel Cen-
14 ter and related missions, functions, and commands until
15 sixty legislative days after the Secretary of Defense sub-
16 mits to the House and Senate Committees on Appropria-
17 tions a report, including complete review comments and
18 a certification, by both the Secretary of Defense and the
19 Comptroller General, justifying and certifying that such
20 plans and actions: (1) do not consolidate, plan to consoli-
21 date, disestablish or realign Department of Defense or
22 Service data processing functions or centers, central de-
23 sign activities, finance and accounting or military and ci-
24 vilian personnel functions and activities, or claim savings
25 from such function and activity consolidations and dis-

1 establishment, realignment, or consolidation plans, that
2 are in more than one defense management report plan or
3 decision or any other Department of Defense or Service
4 consolidation, disestablishment, or realignment plan; (2)
5 utilize criteria primarily weighted to evaluate, measure,
6 and compare how data processing centers, central design
7 activities, financing and accounting and military and civil-
8 ian personnel functions and activities are ranked in terms
9 of operational readiness, customer satisfaction, and the
10 most cost effective and least expensive from a business
11 performance, and regional operations cost standpoint; (3)
12 will provide equal or better service for DOD customers;
13 (4) will not adversely impact the quality of life and bene-
14 fits of the individual service person, dependents, and civil-
15 ian personnel; and (5) will not adversely impact the mis-
16 sion and readiness of the Navy and Naval Reserves: *Pro-*
17 *vided*, That none of the provisions in this section shall,
18 in any way, affect the implementation of the Defense Base
19 Closure and Realignment Commission recommendations.

20 SEC. 8036. Notwithstanding any other provision of
21 law, during the current fiscal year, the Secretary of De-
22 fense may, by Executive Agreement, establish with host
23 nation governments in NATO member states a separate
24 account into which such residual value amounts negotiated
25 in the return of United States military installations in

1 NATO member states may be deposited, in the currency
2 of the host nation, in lieu of direct monetary transfers to
3 the United States Treasury: *Provided*, That such credits
4 may be utilized only for the construction of facilities to
5 support United States military forces in that host nation,
6 or such real property maintenance and base operating
7 costs that are currently executed through monetary trans-
8 fers to such host nations: *Provided further*, That the De-
9 partment of Defense's budget submission for fiscal year
10 1995 shall identify such sums anticipated in residual value
11 settlements, and identify such construction, real property
12 maintenance or base operating costs that shall be funded
13 by the host nation through such credits: *Provided further*,
14 That all military construction projects to be executed from
15 such accounts must be previously approved in a prior Act
16 of Congress: *Provided further*, That each such Executive
17 Agreement with a NATO member host nation shall be re-
18 ported to the Committees on Appropriations and Armed
19 Services of the House of Representatives and the Senate
20 thirty days prior to the conclusion and endorsement of any
21 such agreement established under this provision.

22 SEC. 8037. All obligations incurred in anticipation of
23 the appropriations and authority provided in this Act are
24 hereby ratified and confirmed if otherwise in accordance
25 with the provisions of this Act.

1 SEC. 8038. None of the funds available to the De-
2 partment of Defense in this Act shall be used to demili-
3 tarize or dispose of more than 310,784 unserviceable M1
4 Garand rifles and M1 Carbines.

5 SEC. 8039. Notwithstanding any other provision of
6 law, none of the funds appropriated by this Act shall be
7 available to pay more than 50 percent of an amount paid
8 to any person under section 308 of title 37, United States
9 Code, in a lump sum.

10 SEC. 8040. None of the funds appropriated by this
11 Act may be used by the Department of Defense to assign
12 a supervisor's title or grade when the number of people
13 he or she supervises is considered as a basis for this deter-
14 mination: *Provided*, That savings that result from this
15 provision are represented as such in future budget
16 proposals.

17 SEC. 8041. Of the funds appropriated by this Act,
18 no more than \$18,500,000 shall be available for the men-
19 tal health care demonstration project at Fort Bragg,
20 North Carolina: *Provided*, That adjustments may be made
21 for normal and reasonable price and program growth.

22 SEC. 8042. None of the funds appropriated by this
23 Act may be used to pay health care providers under the
24 Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed
25 Services (CHAMPUS) for services determined under the

1 CHAMPUS Peer Review Organization (PRO) Program to
2 be not medically or psychologically necessary. The Sec-
3 retary of Defense may by regulation adopt any quality and
4 utilization review requirements and procedures in effect
5 for the Peer Review Organization Program under title
6 XVIII of the Social Security Act (Medicare) that the Sec-
7 retary determines necessary, and may adapt the Medicare
8 requirements and procedures to the circumstances of the
9 CHAMPUS PRO Program as the Secretary determines
10 appropriate.

11 SEC. 8043. None of the funds appropriated by this
12 Act shall be available for payments under the Department
13 of Defense contract with the Louisiana State University
14 Medical Center involving the use of cats for Brain Missile
15 Wound Research, and the Department of Defense shall
16 not make payments under such contract from funds obli-
17 gated prior to the date of the enactment of this Act, except
18 as necessary for costs incurred by the contractor prior to
19 the enactment of this Act, and until thirty legislative days
20 after the final General Accounting Office report on the
21 aforesaid contract is submitted for review to the Commit-
22 tees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives
23 and the Senate: *Provided*, That funds necessary for the
24 care of animals covered by this contract are allowed.

1 SEC. 8044. None of the funds provided in this Act
2 or any other Act shall be available to conduct bone trauma
3 research at the Letterman Army Institute of Research
4 until the Secretary of the Army certifies that the synthetic
5 compound to be used in the experiments is of such a type
6 that its use will result in a significant medical finding,
7 the research has military application, the research will be
8 conducted in accordance with the standards set by an ani-
9 mal care and use committee, and the research does not
10 duplicate research already conducted by a manufacturer
11 or any other research organization.

12 SEC. 8045. The Secretary of Defense shall include
13 in any base closure and realignment plan submitted to
14 Congress after the date of enactment of this Act, a com-
15 plete review for the five-year period beginning on Octo-
16 ber 1, 1993, which shall include expected force structure
17 and levels for such period, expected installation require-
18 ments for such period, a budget plan for such period, the
19 cost savings expected to be realized through realignments
20 and closures of military installations during such period,
21 an economics model to identify the critical local economic
22 sectors affected by proposed closures and realignments of
23 military installations and an assessment of the economic
24 impact in each area in which a military installation is to
25 be realigned or closed.

1 SEC. 8046. No more than \$50,000 of the funds ap-
2 propriated or made available in this Act shall be used for
3 any single relocation of an organization, unit, activity or
4 function of the Department of Defense into or within the
5 National Capital Region: *Provided*, That the Secretary of
6 Defense may waive this restriction on a case-by-case basis
7 by certifying in writing to the Committees on Appropria-
8 tions of the House of Representatives and Senate that
9 such a relocation is required in the best interest of the
10 Government: *Provided further*, That no funds appropriated
11 or made available in this Act shall be used for the reloca-
12 tion into the National Capital Region of the Air Force Of-
13 fice of Medical Support located at Brooks Air Force Base.

14 SEC. 8047. During the current fiscal year, funds ap-
15 propriated or otherwise available for any Federal agency,
16 the Congress, the judicial branch, or the District of Co-
17 lumbia may be used for the pay, allowances, and benefits
18 of an employee as defined by section 2105 of title 5 or
19 an individual employed by the government of the District
20 of Columbia, permanent or temporary indefinite, who—

21 (1) is a member of a Reserve component of the
22 armed forces, as described in section 261 of title 10,
23 or the National Guard, as described in section 101
24 of title 32;

1 (2) performs, for the purpose of providing mili-
2 tary aid to enforce the law or providing assistance
3 to civil authorities in the protection or saving of life
4 or property or prevention of injury—

5 (A) Federal service under section 331,
6 332, 333, 3500, or 8500 of title 10, or other
7 provision of law, as applicable, or

8 (B) full-time military service for his State,
9 the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of
10 Puerto Rico, or a territory of the United States;
11 and

12 (3) requests and is granted—

13 (A) leave under the authority of this sec-
14 tion; or

15 (B) annual leave, which may be granted
16 without regard to the provisions of sections
17 5519 and 6323(b) of title 5, if such employee
18 is otherwise entitled to such annual leave:

19 *Provided*, That any employee who requests leave under
20 subsection (3)(A) for service described in subsection (2)
21 of this section is entitled to such leave, subject to the pro-
22 visions of this section and of the last sentence of section
23 6323(b) of title 5, and such leave shall be considered leave
24 under section 6323(b) of title 5.

1 SEC. 8048. None of the funds appropriated by this
2 Act shall be available to perform any cost study pursuant
3 to the provisions of OMB Circular A-76 if the study being
4 performed exceeds a period of twenty-four months after
5 initiation of such study with respect to a single function
6 activity or forty-eight months after initiation of such study
7 for a multi-function activity.

8 SEC. 8049. Funds appropriated by this Act for the
9 American Forces Information Service shall not be used for
10 any national or international political or psychological ac-
11 tivities.

12 SEC. 8050. Notwithstanding any other provision of
13 law or regulation, the Secretary of Defense may adjust
14 wage rates for civilian employees hired for certain health
15 care occupations as authorized for the Secretary of Veter-
16 ans Affairs by section 7455 of title 38, United States
17 Code.

18 SEC. 8051. During the current fiscal year, none of
19 the funds appropriated in this Act may be used to reduce
20 the military or civilian medical and medical support per-
21 sonnel end strength as of September 30, 1993, as defined
22 by section 711(c) of Public Law 101-510: *Provided*, That
23 none of the funds appropriated in this Act may be used
24 to reduce the military or civilian medical and medical sup-
25 port personnel end strength at a base undergoing a partial

1 closure or realignment, where more than one joint com-
2 mand is located, below the September 30, 1991 level.

3 SEC. 8052. Of the funds made available in this Act,
4 not less than \$11,679,000 shall be available for the Civil
5 Air Patrol, of which \$4,642,000 shall be available for
6 Operation and Maintenance.

7 SEC. 8053. None of the funds appropriated or made
8 available in this Act shall be used to reduce or disestablish
9 the operation of the 815th Weather Squadron of the Air
10 Force Reserve, if such action would reduce the WC-130
11 Weather Reconnaissance mission below the levels funded
12 in this Act.

13 SEC. 8054. During the current fiscal year, with-
14 drawal credits may be made by the Defense Business Op-
15 erations Fund to the credit of current applicable appro-
16 priations of an activity of the Department of Defense in
17 connection with the acquisition by that activity of supplies
18 that are repairable components which are repairable at a
19 repair depot and that are capitalized into the Defense
20 Business Operations Fund as the result of management
21 changes concerning depot level repairable assets charged
22 to an activity of the Department of Defense which is a
23 customer of the Defense Business Operations Fund that
24 became effective on April 1, 1992.

1 SEC. 8055. (a) Of the funds for the procurement of
2 supplies or services appropriated by this Act, qualified
3 nonprofit agencies for the blind or other severely handi-
4 capped shall be afforded the maximum practicable oppor-
5 tunity to participate as subcontractors and suppliers in the
6 performance of contracts let by the Department of De-
7 fense.

8 (b) During the current fiscal year, a business concern
9 which has negotiated with a military service or defense
10 agency a subcontracting plan for the participation by
11 small business concerns pursuant to section 8(d) of the
12 Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 637(d)) shall be given
13 credit toward meeting that subcontracting goal for any
14 purchases made from qualified nonprofit agencies for the
15 blind or other severely handicapped.

16 (c) For the purpose of this section, the phrase “quali-
17 fied nonprofit agency for the blind or other severely handi-
18 capped” means a nonprofit agency for the blind or other
19 severely handicapped that has been approved by the Com-
20 mittee for the Purchase from the Blind and Other Severely
21 Handicapped under the Javits-Wagner-O’Day Act (41
22 U.S.C. 46–48).

23 SEC. 8056. During the current fiscal year and there-
24 after, there is established, under the direction and control
25 of the Attorney General, the National Drug Intelligence

1 Center, whose mission it shall be to coordinate and con-
2 solidate drug intelligence from all national security and
3 law enforcement agencies, and produce information re-
4 garding the structure, membership, finances, communica-
5 tions, and activities of drug trafficking organizations: *Pro-*
6 *vided*, That funding for the operation of the National
7 Drug Intelligence Center, including personnel costs associ-
8 ated therewith, shall be provided from the funds appro-
9 priated to the Department of Defense.

10 SEC. 8057. During the current fiscal year and there-
11 after, the Navy may provide notice to exercise options
12 under the LEASAT program for the next fiscal year, in
13 accordance with the terms of the Aide Memoire, dated
14 January 5, 1981, as amended by the Aide Memoire dated
15 April 30, 1986, and as implemented in the LEASAT con-
16 tract.

17 SEC. 8058. During the current fiscal year, net re-
18 ceipts pursuant to collections from third party payers pur-
19 suant to section 1095 of title 10, United States Code, shall
20 be made available to the local facility of the uniformed
21 services responsible for the collections and shall be over
22 and above the facility's direct budget amount.

23 SEC. 8059. None of the funds in this Act shall be
24 obligated for the procurement of Multibeam Sonar Map-
25 ping Systems, and supporting software, not engineered

1 and manufactured in the United States: *Provided*, That
2 the Secretary of the military department responsible for
3 such procurement may waive this restriction on a case-
4 by-case basis by certifying in writing to the Committees
5 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the
6 Senate that adequate domestic supplies are not available
7 to meet Department of Defense requirements on a timely
8 basis and that such an acquisition must be made in order
9 to acquire capability for national security purposes.

10 SEC. 8060. During the current fiscal year and there-
11 after, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the De-
12 partment of Defense is hereby authorized to develop and
13 procure the LANDSAT 7 vehicle.

14 SEC. 8061. None of the funds appropriated in this
15 Act may be used to fill the commander's position at any
16 military medical facility with a health care professional
17 unless the prospective candidate can demonstrate profes-
18 sional administrative skills.

19 SEC. 8062. Of the funds appropriated by this Act for
20 the Defense Health Program, notwithstanding any other
21 provision of law, the amount payable for services provided
22 under this section shall not be less than the amount cal-
23 culated under the coordination of benefits reimbursement
24 formula utilized when CHAMPUS is a secondary payor
25 to medical insurance programs other than Medicare, and

1 such appropriations as necessary shall be available (not-
2 withstanding the last sentence of section 1086(c) of title
3 10, United States Code) to continue Civilian Health and
4 Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS)
5 benefits, until age 65, under such section for a former
6 member of a uniformed service who is entitled to retired
7 or retainer pay or equivalent pay, or a dependent of such
8 a member, or any other beneficiary described by section
9 1086(c) of title 10, United States Code, who becomes eligi-
10 ble for hospital insurance benefits under part A of title
11 XVIII of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 1395 et seq.)
12 solely on the grounds of physical disability, or end stage
13 renal disease: *Provided*, That expenses under this section
14 shall only be covered to the extent that such expenses are
15 not covered under parts A and B of title XVIII of the
16 Social Security Act and are otherwise covered under
17 CHAMPUS: *Provided further*, That no reimbursement
18 shall be made for services provided prior to October 1,
19 1991.

20 SEC. 8063. During the current fiscal year, the Sec-
21 retary of Defense may accept burdensharing contributions
22 in the form of money from Japan, the Republic of Korea,
23 and the State of Kuwait for the costs of local national
24 employees, supplies, and services of the Department of De-
25 fense to be credited to applicable Department of Defense

1 operation and maintenance appropriations available for
2 the salaries and benefits of national employees of Japan,
3 the Republic of Korea, and the State of Kuwait, supplies,
4 and services to be merged with and to be available for the
5 same purposes and time period as those appropriations to
6 which credited: *Provided*, That not later than 30 days
7 after the end of each quarter of the fiscal year, the Sec-
8 retary of Defense shall submit to the Congress a report
9 of contributions accepted by the Secretary under this pro-
10 vision during the preceding quarter.

11 SEC. 8064. (a) Funds appropriated in this Act to fi-
12 nance activities of Department of Defense (DOD) Feder-
13 ally Funded Research and Development Centers
14 (FFRDCs) may not be obligated or expended for an
15 FFRDC if a member of its Board of Directors or Trustees
16 simultaneously serves on the Board of Directors or Trust-
17 ees of a profit-making company under contract to the De-
18 partment of Defense unless the FFRDC has a DOD ap-
19 proved conflict of interest policy for its members.

20 (b) None of the funds appropriated in this Act are
21 available to establish a new FFRDC, either as a new en-
22 tity, or as a separate entity administered by an organiza-
23 tion managing another FFRDC, or as a nonprofit mem-
24 bership corporation consisting of a consortium of other
25 FFRDCs and other nonprofit entities.

1 SEC. 8065. None of the funds appropriated or made
2 available in this Act shall be used to procure carbon, alloy
3 or armor steel plate for use in any Government-owned fa-
4 cility or property under the control of the Department of
5 Defense which were not melted and rolled in the United
6 States or Canada: *Provided*, That these procurement re-
7 strictions shall apply to any and all Federal Supply Class
8 9515, American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM)
9 or American Iron and Steel Institute (AISI) specifications
10 of carbon, alloy or armor steel plate: *Provided further*,
11 That the Secretary of the military department responsible
12 for the procurement may waive this restriction on a case-
13 by-case basis by certifying in writing to the Committees
14 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the
15 Senate that adequate domestic supplies are not available
16 to meet Department of Defense requirements on a timely
17 basis and that such an acquisition must be made in order
18 to acquire capability for national security purposes: *Pro-*
19 *vided further*, That these restrictions shall not apply to
20 contracts which are in being as of the date of enactment
21 of this Act.

22 SEC. 8066. Notwithstanding any other provision of
23 law, no more than 15 percent of the funds available to
24 the Department of Defense for sealift may be used to ac-
25 quire, directly or indirectly, through charter or purchase,

1 ships constructed in foreign shipyards: *Provided*, That
2 ships acquired as provided above shall be necessary to sat-
3 isfy the shortfalls identified in the Mobility Requirements
4 Study: *Provided further*, That any work required to con-
5 vert foreign built ships acquired as provided above to Unit-
6 ed States Coast Guard and American Bureau of Shipping
7 standards, or conversion to a more useful military configu-
8 ration, must be accomplished in United States domestic
9 shipyards: *Provided further*, That none of the funds shall
10 be used to purchase the following major components:
11 bridge or machinery control systems, or interior commu-
12 nications equipment, auxiliary equipment, including
13 pumps for all shipboard services, propulsion system com-
14 ponents (that is, engines, reduction gears, and propellers),
15 shipboard cranes, and spreaders for shipboard cranes for
16 sealift ships unless the systems or equipment, and their
17 components, are manufactured in the United States: *Pro-*
18 *vided further*, That the Secretary of the military depart-
19 ment responsible for such procurement may waive this re-
20 striction on a case-by-case basis by certifying in writing
21 to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Rep-
22 resentatives and the Senate that adequate domestic sup-
23 plies are not available to meet Department of Defense re-
24 quirements on a timely basis and that such an acquisition

1 must be made in order to acquire capability for national
2 security purposes.

3 SEC. 8067. For the purposes of this Act, the term
4 “congressional defense committees” means the Commit-
5 tees on Armed Services, the Committees on Appropria-
6 tions, and the subcommittees on Defense of the Committee
7 on Appropriations, of the Senate and the House of Rep-
8 resentatives.

9 SEC. 8068. Notwithstanding any other provision of
10 law, during the current fiscal year, the Secretary of De-
11 fense may acquire the modification, depot maintenance
12 and repair of aircraft, vehicles and vessels as well as the
13 production of components and other Defense-related arti-
14 cles, through competition between Department of Defense
15 depot maintenance activities and private firms: *Provided,*
16 That the Senior Acquisition Executive of the military de-
17 partment or defense agency concerned, with power of dele-
18 gation, shall certify that successful bids include com-
19 parable estimates of all direct and indirect costs for both
20 public and private bids: *Provided further,* That Office of
21 Management and Budget Circular A-76 shall not apply
22 to competitions conducted under this section.

23 SEC. 8069. (a)(1) If the Secretary of Defense, after
24 consultation with the United States Trade Representative,
25 determines that a foreign country which is party to an

1 agreement described in paragraph (2) has violated the
2 terms of the agreement by discriminating against certain
3 types of products produced in the United States that are
4 covered by the agreement, the Secretary of Defense shall
5 rescind the Secretary's blanket waiver of the Buy Amer-
6 ican Act with respect to such types of products produced
7 in that foreign country.

8 (2) An agreement referred to in paragraph (1) is any
9 reciprocal defense procurement memorandum of under-
10 standing, between the United States and a foreign country
11 pursuant to which the Secretary of Defense has prospec-
12 tively waived the Buy American Act for certain products
13 in that country.

14 (b) The Secretary of Defense shall submit to Con-
15 gress a report on the amount of Department of Defense
16 purchases from foreign entities in fiscal year 1994. Such
17 report shall separately indicate the dollar value of items
18 for which the Buy American Act was waived pursuant to
19 any agreement described in subsection (a)(2), the Trade
20 Agreement Act of 1979 (19 U.S.C. 2501 et seq.), or any
21 international agreement to which the United States is a
22 party.

23 (c) For purposes of this section, the term "Buy
24 American Act" means title III of the Act entitled "An
25 Act making appropriations for the Treasury and Post

1 Office Departments for the fiscal year ending June 30,
2 1934, and for other purposes'', approved March 3,
3 1933 (41 U.S.C. 10a et seq.).

4 SEC. 8070. (a) Of the funds made available in this
5 Act in title II, Operation and Maintenance, Army,
6 \$5,000,000 shall be available only to execute the cleanup
7 of uncontrolled hazardous waste contamination affecting
8 the Sale Parcel at Hamilton Air Force Base, in Novato,
9 in the State of California.

10 (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in the
11 event that the purchaser of the Sale Parcel exercises its
12 option to withdraw from all or a portion of the sale, as
13 provided in the Agreement and Modification, dated Sep-
14 tember 25, 1990, between the Department of Defense, the
15 General Services Administration, and the purchaser, as
16 amended, the purchaser's deposit of \$4,500,000 shall be
17 returned by the General Services Administration and
18 funds eligible for reimbursement under the Agreement and
19 Modification, as amended, shall come from the funds made
20 available to the Department of Defense by this Act.

21 (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in the
22 event that the purchaser purchases only a portion of the
23 Sale Parcel and exercises its option to withdraw from the
24 sale as to the rest of the Sale Parcel, the portion of the
25 Sale Parcel that is not purchased (other than Landfill 26

1 and an appropriate buffer area around it), together with
2 any of the land referred to in section 9099(e) of Public
3 Law 102-396 that is not purchased by the purchaser,
4 shall be sold to the City of Novato, in the State of Califor-
5 nia, for the sum of One Dollar as a public benefit transfer
6 for school, classroom or other educational use, for use as
7 a public park or recreation area or for further conveyance
8 as provided herein, subject to the following restrictions:
9 (1) if the City sells any portion of such land to any third
10 party within ten years after the transfer to the City, which
11 sale may be made without the foregoing use restrictions,
12 any proceeds received by the City in connection with such
13 sale, minus the demonstrated reasonable costs of conduct-
14 ing the sale and of any improvements made by the City
15 to the land following its acquisition of the land (but only
16 to the extent such improvements increase the value of the
17 portion sold), shall be immediately turned over to the
18 Army in reimbursement of the withdrawal payment made
19 by the Army to the contract purchaser and the costs of
20 cleaning up the Landfill and (2) until one year following
21 completion of the cleanup of contaminated soil in the land-
22 fill and completion of the groundwater treatment facilities,
23 the sale must be at a per-acre price for the portion sold
24 that is at least equal to the per-acre contract price paid
25 by the purchaser for the portion of the Sale Parcel pur-

1 chased under the Agreement and Modification, as amend-
2 ed, and thereafter must be at a price at least equal to
3 the fair market value of the portion sold. The foregoing
4 restrictions shall not apply to a transfer to another public
5 or quasi-public agency for public uses of the kind de-
6 scribed above. The deed to the City shall contain a clause
7 providing that, if any of the proceeds referred to in clause
8 (1) are not delivered to the Army within 30 days after
9 sale, or any portion of the land not sold as provided herein
10 is used for other than educational, park or recreational
11 uses, title to the applicable portion of such land shall re-
12 vert to the United States Government at the election of
13 the General Services Administration. The Army shall
14 agree to deliver into the applicable closing escrow an ac-
15 knowledgement of receipt of any proceeds described in
16 clause (1) above and a release of the reverter right as to
17 the affected land, effective upon such receipt.

18 (d) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the
19 Air Force shall be reimbursed for expenditures in excess
20 of \$15,000,000 in connection with the total clean-up of
21 uncontrolled hazardous waste contamination on the afore-
22 mentioned Sale Parcel from the proceeds collected upon
23 the closing of any portion of the Sale Parcel purchased
24 by the contract purchaser under the Agreement and Modi-
25 fication, as amended.

1 SEC. 8071. Notwithstanding any other provision of
2 law, the Secretary of Defense may, when he considers it
3 in the best interest of the United States, cancel any part
4 of an indebtedness, up to \$2,500, that is or was owed to
5 the United States by a member or former member of a
6 uniformed service if such indebtedness, as determined by
7 the Secretary, was incurred in connection with Operation
8 Desert Shield/Storm: *Provided*, That the amount of an in-
9 debtedness previously paid by a member or former mem-
10 ber and cancelled under this section shall be refunded to
11 the member.

12 SEC. 8072. Appropriations contained in this Act that
13 remain available at the end of the current fiscal year as
14 a result of energy cost savings realized by the Department
15 of Defense shall remain available for obligation for the
16 next fiscal year to the extent, and for the purposes, pro-
17 vided in section 2865 of title 10, United States Code.

18 SEC. 8073. During the current fiscal year, voluntary
19 separation incentives payable under 10 U.S.C. 1175 may
20 be paid in such amounts as are necessary from the assets
21 of the Voluntary Separation Incentive Fund established by
22 section 1175(h)(1).

23 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

24 SEC. 8074. Amounts deposited during fiscal years
25 1993 and 1994 to the special account established under
26 40 U.S.C. 485(h)(2) and to the special account established

1 under 10 U.S.C. 2667(d)(1) are appropriated and shall
2 be available until transferred by the Secretary of Defense
3 to current applicable appropriations or funds of the De-
4 partment of Defense under the terms and conditions speci-
5 fied by 40 U.S.C. 485(h)(2) (A) and (B) and 10 U.S.C.
6 2667(d)(1)(B), to be merged with and to be available for
7 the same time period and the same purposes as the appro-
8 priation to which transferred.

9 SEC. 8075. In order to maintain an electric furnace
10 capacity in the United States, preference for the purchase
11 of chromite ore and manganese ore authorized for disposal
12 from the National Defense Stockpile shall be given to do-
13 mestic producers of high carbon ferrochromium and high
14 carbon ferromanganese—

15 (A) whose primary output during the three pre-
16 ceding years has been ferrochromium or
17 ferromanganese; and

18 (B) who guarantee to use the chromite and
19 manganese ore for domestic purposes.

20 SEC. 8076. During the current fiscal year, none of
21 the funds available to the Department of Defense may be
22 used to procure or acquire (1) defensive handguns or de-
23 fensive handgun ammunition unless such handguns or
24 handgun ammunition are the M9 9mm Department of De-
25 fense standard handgun or ammunition for such hand-

1 guns, or (2) offensive handguns and ammunition except
2 for the Special Operations Forces.

3 SEC. 8077. During the current fiscal year, appropria-
4 tions available to the Department of Defense may be used
5 to reimburse a member of a reserve component of the
6 Armed Forces who is not otherwise entitled to travel and
7 transportation allowances and who occupies transient gov-
8 ernment housing while performing active duty for training
9 or inactive duty training: *Provided*, That such members
10 may be provided lodging in kind if transient government
11 quarters are unavailable as if the member was entitled to
12 such allowances under subsection (a) of section 404 of title
13 37, United States Code: *Provided further*, That if lodging
14 in kind is provided, any authorized service charge or cost
15 of such lodging may be paid directly from funds appro-
16 priated for operation and maintenance of the reserve com-
17 ponent of the member concerned.

18 SEC. 8078. For fiscal year 1994, the total amount
19 appropriated to fund the Uniformed Services Treatment
20 Facilities program, operated pursuant to section 911 of
21 Public Law 97-99 (42 U.S.C. 248c), is limited to
22 \$291,000,000, of which not more than \$265,000,000 may
23 be provided by the funds appropriated by this Act.

24 SEC. 8079. None of the funds available in this Act
25 may be used to support in any manner, including travel

1 or other related expenses, the “Tailhook Association”:
2 *Provided*, That investigations by the Secretary of the Navy
3 or consultation with the Tailhook Association are not pro-
4 hibited by this provision.

5 SEC. 8080. During the current fiscal year and there-
6 after, from funds available to the Department of Defense,
7 the Director of the Air National Guard shall operate a
8 Command, Control, Communications and Intelligence
9 planning office manned by three full-time Air Guard offi-
10 cers in the rank of O-6, O-5, and O-4: *Provided*, That
11 these officers shall be in addition to the strengths author-
12 ized in section 524 of title 10, United States Code.

13 SEC. 8081. None of the funds appropriated in this
14 Act or made available to the Department of Defense and
15 deposited into the Pentagon Reservation Maintenance Re-
16 volving Fund may be used for the purpose of constructing
17 a Pentagon Maintenance Facility, a Logistics Support Ex-
18 tension, or any other building not an integral part of the
19 present Pentagon building.

20 SEC. 8082. The President shall include with each
21 budget for a fiscal year submitted to the Congress under
22 section 1105 of title 31, United States Code, materials
23 that shall identify clearly and separately the amounts re-
24 quested in the budget for appropriation for that fiscal year
25 for salaries and expenses related to administrative activi-

1 ties of the Department of Defense, the military
2 departments, and the Defense Agencies.

3 SEC. 8083. None of the funds available to the De-
4 partment of Defense may be obligated or expended for
5 construction of Ground Wave Emergency Network
6 (GWEN) sites in Fiscal Year 1994.

7 SEC. 8084. The \$15,000,000 made available in sec-
8 tion 9088 of the Department of Defense Appropriations
9 Act, 1993 (Public Law 102-396) for payment of claims
10 to United States military and civilian personnel for dam-
11 ages incurred as a result of the volcanic eruption of Mount
12 Pinatubo in the Philippines, shall remain available for ob-
13 ligation until September 30, 1994, notwithstanding sec-
14 tion 9003 of that Act.

15 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

16 SEC. 8085. In addition to any other transfer author-
17 ity contained in this Act, \$100,000,000 appropriated in
18 this Act under the heading "Operation and Maintenance,
19 Defense-Wide" may be transferred to appropriations con-
20 tained in this Act which are available for the payment of
21 civilian voluntary separation incentives, to be merged with
22 and to be available for the same purposes and for the same
23 time period as the appropriations to which transferred.

24 SEC. 8086. During the current fiscal year, amounts
25 contained in the Department of Defense Overseas Military
26 Facility Investment Recovery Account established by sec-

1 tion 2921(c)(1) of the National Defense Authorization Act
2 of 1991, (Public Law 101-510; 10 U.S.C. 2687 note)
3 shall be available until expended for the payments speci-
4 fied by section 2921(c)(2) of that Act.

5 SEC. 8087. During the current fiscal year, annual
6 payments granted under the provisions of section 4416 of
7 the National Defense Authorization Act for fiscal year
8 1993 (Public Law 102-428; 106 Stat. 2714) shall be
9 made from appropriations in this Act which are available
10 for the pay of reserve component personnel.

11 SEC. 8088. None of the funds appropriated by this
12 Act may be used to relocate the 116th Fighter Wing of
13 the Air National Guard from Dobbins Air Reserve Base
14 to Robins Air Force Base, or to convert that wing from
15 F-15A aircraft to B-1B aircraft.

16 SEC. 8089. (a) IN GENERAL.—Subject to subsection
17 (b), the Secretary of the Army may release, discharge,
18 waive, and quitclaim all right, title, and interest which the
19 United States may have by virtue of the quitclaim deed
20 dated June 18, 1956, in and to approximately 6.89 acres
21 of real property, with improvements thereon, in Harris
22 County, Texas.

23 (b) CONDITION.—The Secretary may carry out sub-
24 section (a) only after obtaining satisfactory assurances
25 that the State of Texas shall obtain, in exchange for the

1 real property referred to in subsection (a), a tract of real
2 property—

3 (1) which is at least equal in value to the real
4 property referred to in subsection (a), and

5 (2) which shall be, on the date on which the
6 State obtains it, subject to the same restrictions and
7 covenants with respect to the Federal Government
8 as are applicable on the date of the enactment of
9 this Act to the real property referred to in sub-
10 section (a).

11 (c) LEGAL DESCRIPTION OF REAL PROPERTY.—The
12 exact acreage and legal description of the real property
13 referred to in subsection (a) shall be based upon surveys
14 that are satisfactory to the Secretary.

15 SEC. 8090. None of the funds appropriated by this
16 Act shall be used to procure aircraft fuel cells unless the
17 fuel cells are produced or manufactured in the United
18 States by a domestic-owned and domestic-operated entity:
19 *Provided*, That the Secretary of the military department
20 responsible for the procurement may waive this restriction
21 on a case-by-case basis by certifying in writing to the
22 Committees on Appropriations of the House of Represent-
23 atives and the Senate that adequate domestic supplies are
24 not available to meet Department of Defense requirements
25 on a timely basis and that such an acquisition must be

1 made in order to acquire capability for national security
2 purposes.

3 SEC. 8091. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision
4 of law, not less than \$750,000 of the funds appropriated
5 under the heading “Operation and Maintenance, Army”
6 in title II of this Act shall be made available until ex-
7 pended to conduct a demonstration program involving the
8 Army Senior Reserve Officers’ Training Corps battalion
9 at Indiana University-Northwest and Army Junior Re-
10 serve Officers’ Training Corps units near the University.
11 The purpose of the program shall be to encourage minor-
12 ity students in secondary educational institutions to con-
13 tinue their education.

14 (b) Under the program, Senior Reserve Officers’
15 Corps cadets may serve as mentors and tutors for students
16 in Junior Reserve Officers’ Corps units. Cadets and stu-
17 dents may participate in combined activities, including
18 summer camps, field training, and other traditional mili-
19 tary activities.

20 (c) Senior Reserve Officers’ Corps cadets who serve
21 as mentors and tutors may be paid a stipend.

22 (d) After a cadet has satisfactorily served in the pro-
23 gram, under criteria established by the Secretary of the
24 Army and for a period of time determined by the Sec-
25 retary, the cadet may be provided financial assistance tui-

1 tion, books, laboratory fees, and similar educational ex-
2 penses if the cadet continues to serve satisfactorily in the
3 program.

4 SEC. 8092. During the current fiscal year, appropria-
5 tions which are available to the Department of Defense
6 for operation and maintenance may be used to purchase
7 items having an investment item unit cost of not more
8 than \$50,000.

9 SEC. 8093. None of the funds appropriated by this
10 Act shall be available for direct or indirect support of the
11 joint Department of Defense/Department of Energy Safe-
12 guard C contingent nuclear testing program.

13 SEC. 8094. In connection with procurements of petro-
14 leum products made by the Department of Defense with
15 appropriated funds, the Secretary shall consider all quali-
16 fied bids from any eligible country under the Caribbean
17 Basin Economic Recovery Act which is hereby deemed a
18 designated country pursuant to 19 U.S.C. 2511(b).

19 SEC. 8095. During the current fiscal year, appropria-
20 tions available for the pay and allowances of active duty
21 members of the Armed Forces shall be available to pay
22 the retired pay which is payable pursuant to section 4403
23 of Public Law 102-484 (10 U.S.C. 1293 note) under the
24 terms and conditions provided in section 4403.

1 SEC. 8096. None of the funds appropriated in this
2 Act may be used to pay the salaries of more than two
3 Senior Executive Service positions within the Office of the
4 Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works: *Provided*,
5 That the individuals in these positions may not be com-
6 pensated at a rate higher than level three of the Senior
7 Executive Service.

8 SEC. 8097. (a) During the current fiscal year, none
9 of the appropriations or funds available to the Defense
10 Business Operations Fund shall be used for the purchase
11 of an investment item for the purpose of acquiring a new
12 inventory item for sale or anticipated sale during the cur-
13 rent fiscal year or a subsequent fiscal year to customers
14 of the Defense Business Operations Fund if such an item
15 would not have been chargeable to the Defense Business
16 Operations Fund during fiscal year 1993 and if the pur-
17 chase of such an investment item would be chargeable dur-
18 ing the current fiscal year to appropriations made to the
19 Department of Defense for procurement.

20 (b) The fiscal year 1995 budget request for the De-
21 partment of Defense as well as all justification material
22 and other documentation supporting the fiscal year 1995
23 Department of Defense budget shall be prepared and sub-
24 mitted to the Congress on the basis that any equipment
25 which was classified as an end item and funded in a pro-

1 curement appropriation contained in this Act shall be
2 budgeted for in a proposed fiscal year 1995 procurement
3 appropriation and not in the supply management business
4 area or any other area or category of the Defense Business
5 Operations Fund.

6 SEC. 8098. (a) The prohibition in section 133(a)(2)
7 of the National Defense Authorization Act for fiscal years
8 1990 and 1991 (Public Law 101-189; 103 Stat. 1383)
9 does not apply to the obligation of funds in amounts not
10 to exceed \$216,000,000 for the procurement of not more
11 than 36 OH-58D Scout aircraft from funds appropriated
12 in title III of this Act.

13 (b) The prohibition in section 132(a)(2) of the Na-
14 tional Defense Authorization Act for 1990 and 1991 (Pub-
15 lic Law 101-189; 103 Stat. 1383) does not apply to the
16 obligation of funds in amounts not to exceed
17 \$368,430,000 for the procurement of not more than 24
18 AH-64 aircraft from funds appropriated in title III of this
19 Act.

20 SEC. 8099. The Department of Defense may not pur-
21 chase at wholesale or retail, a cement product manufac-
22 tured by the burning of hazardous or toxic waste unless
23 the following written notice is included with the product:
24 “WARNING: This cement product was manufactured by
25 a process that burns a hazardous material and may con-

1 tain residue of the hazardous material. Use appropriately
2 for the risk involved.” This warning must be printed in
3 a size and type that is clearly legible and on all bagged
4 products and on the shipping manifest if the product is
5 purchased in bulk.

6 SEC. 8100. (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds
7 that—

8 (1) the United States Government has not
9 made adequate efforts to seek the payment of com-
10 pensation by the government of Peru for the death
11 and injuries to United States military personnel re-
12 sulting from the attack by aircraft of the military
13 forces of Peru on April 24, 1992, against a United
14 States Air Force C-130 aircraft operating off the
15 coast of Peru; and

16 (2) in failing to make such efforts adequately,
17 the United States Government has failed in its obli-
18 gation to support the servicemen and their families
19 involved in the incident and generally to support
20 members of the Armed Forces carrying out missions
21 on behalf of the United States.

22 (b) SEMIANNUAL REPORT.—The Secretary of De-
23 fense shall submit a report to Congress on December 1
24 and June 1 of each year on the efforts made by the Gov-
25 ernment of the United States during the preceding six-

1 month period to seek the payment of fair and equitable
2 compensation by the Government of Peru (1) to the survi-
3 vors of Master Sergeant Joseph Beard, Jr., United States
4 Air Force, who was killed in the attack described in sub-
5 section (a), and (2) to the other crew members who were
6 wounded in the attack and survived.

7 (c) TERMINATION OF REPORT REQUIREMENT.—The
8 requirement in subsection (b) shall terminate upon certifi-
9 cation by the Secretary of Defense to Congress that the
10 Government of Peru has paid fair and equitable com-
11 pensation as described in subsection (b).

12 SEC. 8101. Notwithstanding any other provision of
13 law or regulation, the Department of Defense is directed
14 to use available off the shelf, nondevelopmental items in
15 filling small craft and small boat requirements when at
16 all possible.

17 SEC. 8102. No part of the funds in this Act shall
18 be available to prepare or present a request to the Com-
19 mittees on Appropriations for reprogramming of funds,
20 unless for higher priority items, based on unforeseen mili-
21 tary requirements, than those for which originally appro-
22 priated and in no case where the item for which
23 reprogramming is requested has been denied by the Con-
24 gress.

1 SEC. 8103. None of the funds appropriated by this
2 Act shall be available for payment of the compensation
3 of personnel assigned to or serving in the National For-
4 eign Intelligence Program in excess of 96 percent of such
5 personnel actually assigned to or serving in the National
6 Foreign Intelligence Program on September 30, 1992:
7 *Provided*, That in making any reduction in the number
8 of such personnel that may be required pursuant to this
9 section, the percentage of reductions to Senior Intelligence
10 Service positions shall be equal to or exceed the percentage
11 of reductions to non-Senior Intelligence Service positions:
12 *Provided further*, That in making any reduction in the
13 number of such personnel that may be required pursuant
14 to this section, the percentage of reductions to positions
15 in the National Capital Region shall be equal to or exceed
16 the percentage of reductions to positions outside of the
17 National Capital Region.

18 SEC. 8104. None of the funds provided by this Act
19 may be used to pay the salaries of any person or persons
20 who authorize the transfer of obligated and deobligated
21 appropriations into the Reserve for Contingencies of the
22 Central Intelligence Agency.

23 SEC. 8105. During the current fiscal year and there-
24 after, funds appropriated for construction projects of the
25 Central Intelligence Agency, which are transferred to an-

1 other Agency for execution, shall remain available until ex-
2 pended.

3 SEC. 8106. During the current fiscal year and there-
4 after, monetary limitations on the purchase price of a pas-
5 senger motor vehicle shall not apply to vehicles purchased
6 for intelligence activities conducted pursuant to Executive
7 Order 12333 or successor orders.

8 SEC. 8107. None of the funds appropriated by this
9 Act for programs of the Central Intelligence Agency shall
10 remain available for obligation beyond the current fiscal
11 year, except for funds appropriated for the Reserve for
12 Contingencies, which shall remain available until Septem-
13 ber 30, 1995.

14 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

15 SEC. 8108. During the current fiscal year and there-
16 after, no funds may be made available through transfer,
17 reprogramming, or other means between the Central Intel-
18 ligence Agency and the Department of Defense for any
19 intelligence or special activity different from that pre-
20 viously justified to the Congress unless the Director of
21 Central Intelligence or the Secretary of Defense has noti-
22 fied the House and Senate Appropriations Committees of
23 the intent to make such funds available for such activity.

24 SEC. 8109. The classified annex prepared by the
25 Committee on Appropriations to accompany the report on
26 the Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 1994 is

1 hereby incorporated into this Act: *Provided*, That the
2 amounts specified in the classified Annex are not in addi-
3 tion to amounts appropriated by other provisions of this
4 Act: *Provided further*, That the President shall provide for
5 appropriate distribution of the classified Annex, or of ap-
6 propriate portions of the classified Annex, within the exec-
7 utive branch of the Government.

8 SEC. 8110. Notwithstanding any other provision of
9 law, funds made available in this Act for the Defense In-
10 telligence Agency may be used for the design, develop-
11 ment, and deployment of General Defense Intelligence
12 Program intelligence communications and intelligence in-
13 formation systems at the Unified and Specified Com-
14 mands.

15 SEC. 8111. After March 1, 1994, none of the funds
16 appropriated by this Act shall be available for any Na-
17 tional Foreign Intelligence Program: *Provided*, That this
18 provision shall not apply for any National Foreign Intel-
19 ligence Program for which budget exhibits were submitted
20 to the House Committee on Appropriations which justifies
21 in detail all funds requested for “base”, “ongoing”, and
22 “new” programs for fiscal year 1995.

23 SEC. 8112. None of the funds appropriated by this
24 Act shall be available for the planning, programming or
25 actual movement of any component or function of the De-

1 fense Mapping Agency Aerospace Center annex from the
2 St. Louis, Missouri, area.

3 SEC. 8113. (a) During the current fiscal year and
4 hereafter the provisions of law specified in subsection (b)
5 shall not extend to any military firearms (or ammunition,
6 components, parts, accessories, and attachments for such
7 firearms) of United States manufacture furnished to any
8 foreign government by the United States under the Arms
9 Export Control Act or any other foreign assistance or
10 sales program of the United States if—

11 (1) such firearms are among those firearms de-
12 scribed in clause (i) of the second subparagraph (B)
13 of section 38(b)(1) of the Arms Export Control Act;
14 and

15 (2) such foreign government certifies to the
16 United States Government that such foreign govern-
17 ment has transferred such firearms to a person who
18 is not an officer, employee, or agent of such foreign
19 government for the purpose of returning such fire-
20 arms to the United States for sale in the United
21 States.

22 (b) The provisions of law specified in this subsection
23 are—

1 (1) the prohibition under the regulations re-
2 quired by the second sentence of section 38(b)(1)(A)
3 of the Arms Export Control Act; and

4 (2) the requirements contained in—

5 (A) subsections (a)(1), (a)(4), and (e) of
6 section 505 of the Foreign Assistance Act of
7 1961; and

8 (B) paragraph (2) of subsection (a), and
9 the third sentence of such subsection, of section
10 3 of the Arms Export Control Act.

11 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

12 SEC. 8114. In addition to amounts appropriated or
13 otherwise made available by this Act, \$21,700,000 is here-
14 by appropriated to the Department of Defense and shall
15 be available only for transfer to the United States Coast
16 Guard for a 2.2 percent pay increase for uniformed mem-
17 bers.

18 SEC. 8115. None of the funds appropriated or made
19 available in this Act shall be obligated or expended for the
20 performance of depot-level maintenance by the Depart-
21 ment of Defense unless such activities are conducted in
22 accordance with section 2466(a) of title 10, United States
23 Code, as amended by Public Law 102-484.

24 SEC. 8116. Notwithstanding any other provision of
25 law, and in accordance with section 2905 of the Defense
26 Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990, Public Law

1 101–510, the Department of Defense shall proceed with
2 implementation of the 1993 Defense Base Closure and Re-
3 alignment Commission recommendation concerning the
4 consolidation of tactical missile maintenance at
5 Letterkenny Army Depot.

6 SEC. 8117. Notwithstanding any other provision of
7 law, the Secretary of the Navy shall obligate the funds
8 appropriated for fiscal years 1992 and 1993 for the USH-
9 42 Mission Recorder program for the A-6 aircraft.

10 SEC. 8118. In addition to amounts appropriated else-
11 where in this Act, \$200,000 shall be available only for set-
12 tlement of claims and interest thereon, associated with
13 contract numbered N62474–86–C–0253 for construction
14 of a multipurpose range complex at the Marine Corps Air
15 Ground Combat Center in Twentynine Palms, California:
16 *Provided*, That such settlement shall be made pursuant
17 to the recommendation of August 19, 1993, of the Comp-
18 troller General of the United States (case B–230871.3).

19 SEC. 8119. Not withstanding any other provision of
20 law, none of the funds appropriated for fiscal year 1993
21 and fiscal year 1994 for the DDG–51 destroyer program
22 shall be obligated or expended for procurement of the ring
23 laser gyroscope inertial navigation system under a sole
24 source contract.

1 SEC. 8120. The Secretary of the Navy shall carry out
2 the establishment of the Mine Warfare Center of Excel-
3 lence at the naval station at Ingleside, Texas (including
4 the establishment of all subordinate units and the reloca-
5 tion of Navy mine warfare forces), in accordance with the
6 schedule of the Navy for the establishment of such center
7 and without regard to any alteration in that schedule that
8 would otherwise be required pursuant to any other provi-
9 sion of law enacted during the first session of the 103d
10 Congress that applies specifically to the construction and
11 operation of that center or to the relocation of Navy mine
12 warfare forces to Ingleside, Texas.

13 SEC. 8121. (a) The amount expended during fiscal
14 year 1994 from funds appropriated by this Act or any
15 prior Department of Defense Appropriations Act shall not
16 exceed \$255,795,000,000.

17 (b) The Secretary of Defense and the Director of
18 Central Intelligence shall take such steps as necessary to
19 ensure compliance with the requirement in subsection (a).

20 (c) The provisions of the Impoundment Control Act
21 of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 681 et seq.) shall not apply with respect
22 to funds appropriated by this Act or any prior Department
23 of Defense Appropriations Act to the extent necessary to
24 enable the Secretary of Defense to comply with sub-
25 section (a).

1 (d) Any payment required to be made by the Depart-
2 ment of Defense to a business concern that, but for this
3 subsection, would be required to be made during Septem-
4 ber, 1994 may be made during the period beginning on
5 October 1, 1994, and ending on the date that is 30 days
6 after the date on which the payment would otherwise be
7 required to be made. In determining the amount of any
8 interest penalty under section 3902 of title 31, United
9 States Code, for failure to make any such payment, any
10 period for which the Secretary of Defense, under the pre-
11 ceding sentence, deferred the required payment date shall
12 not be taken into account.

13 (e)(1) The Secretary of Defense shall, on each of the
14 dates specified in paragraph (2), submit to the Commit-
15 tees on Appropriations and the Committees on Armed
16 Services of the Senate and House of Representatives a re-
17 port on the implementation of this section. Each such re-
18 port shall include—

19 (A) an analysis of cumulative obligations and
20 cumulative expenditures from accounts subject to
21 the limitation in subsection (a) during the period be-
22 ginning on October 1, 1993, and ending on the last
23 day of the month preceding the month in which the
24 report is to be submitted, including a comparison of
25 such obligations and expenditures with the relevant

1 estimates of outlays made by the Office of Manage-
2 ment and Budget and the Congressional Budget Of-
3 fice; and

4 (B) a description of the specific actions taken
5 by the Secretary to ensure that the Department of
6 Defense meets the requirements of subsection (a).

7 (2) The reports required by paragraph (1) shall be
8 submitted not later than the following dates in 1994:
9 January 15, April 15, July 15, September 15, and October
10 15.

11 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

12 SEC. 8122. Upon enactment of this Act, the Sec-
13 retary of Defense shall make the following transfers of
14 funds: *Provided*, That the amounts transferred shall be
15 available for the same purposes as the appropriations to
16 which transferred, and for the same time period as the
17 appropriation from which transferred: *Provided further*,
18 That the amounts shall be transferred between the follow-

3 SEC. 8123. None of the funds in this Act are avail-
4 able for any board, committee, or panel which develops,
5 sets, defines, or recommends National Foreign Intelligence
6 Program requirements: *Provided*, That this provision shall
7 not apply to any such board, committee, or panel for which
8 a majority of the members are not career intelligence or
9 cryptologic professionals.

10 SEC. 8124. The Departments of Defense and Air
11 Force are directed to obligate, no later than thirty days
12 after enactment of this Act, the \$55,500,000 appropriated
13 for research and development in Public Law 102-396 only
14 for the continuance of the Space Nuclear Thermal Propul-
15 sion Program.

16 SEC. 8125. The Secretary of Defense and the Direc-
17 tor of Central Intelligence shall deliver, in conjunction
18 with the fiscal year 1995 budget request, a report provid-
19 ing the following information about all research and devel-
20 opment projects involving the implementation, monitoring,
21 or verification of current and projected international arms
22 control agreements: (a) annual and total budgets, goals,
23 schedules, and priorities; (b) relationships among related
24 projects being funded by the Department of Defense, the
25 National Foreign Intelligence Program, and other depart-

5 SEC. 8126. Notwithstanding any other provision of
6 law, none of the funds appropriated in this or any other
7 Act shall be used for the purchase of a totally enclosed
8 lifeboat survival system, which consists of the lifeboat and
9 associated davits and winches, if less than 75 percent of
10 the entire system's components are manufactured in the
11 United States, and if less than 75 percent of the labor
12 in the manufacture and assembly of the entire system is
13 performed in the United States.

14 SEC. 8127. None of the funds appropriated by this
15 Act may be used (1) to transfer to the United Nations
16 a facility in the continental United States for use as a
17 United Nations peacekeeping facility, or (2) for the ren-
18 novation of such a facility in preparation for such a trans-
19 fer.

20 This Act may be cited as the "Department of Defense
21 Appropriations Act, 1994".

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
