## A BILL

To make supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 1994 to provide for a full employment economy, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Full Employment Act  
5 for Fiscal Year 1994”.

1 **TITLE I—SUPPLEMENTAL AP-**  
2 **PROPRIATIONS FOR FULL**  
3 **EMPLOYMENT ECONOMY**

4 The following sums are appropriated, out of any  
5 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pro-  
6 vide supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 1994:

7 CHAPTER I—DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE,  
8 RURAL DEVELOPMENT, FOOD AND DRUG  
9 ADMINISTRATION, AND RELATED AGEN-  
10 CIES

11 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

12 SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE

13 WATERSHED AND FLOOD PREVENTION OPERATIONS

14 For an additional amount for “Watershed and flood  
15 prevention operations”, \$43,600,000 for the costs of emer-  
16 gency watershed protection operations and for small  
17 watershed operations.

18 RURAL DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

19 RURAL WATER AND WASTE DISPOSAL GRANTS

20 For an additional amount for “Rural water and waste  
21 disposal grants”, \$246,800,000.

## 1                   **TITLE II—WORK HOURS**

### 2   **SEC. 201. OVERTIME COMPENSATION LIMIT.**

3           (a) ACT.—The Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938  
4 (29 U.S.C. 201 et seq.) is amended by striking out “one  
5 and one-half times” each place it occurs and inserting  
6 “two times” and by striking out “forty hours” each place  
7 it occurs and inserting “thirty hours”.

8           (b) SECTIONS.—

9               (1) SECTION 7.—Section 7 of such Act (29  
10 U.S.C. 207) is amended—

11                   (A) in subsection (b)(1), by striking “one  
12 thousand and forty” and inserting “seven hun-  
13 dred and eighty”,

14                   (B) in subsection (b)(2), by striking “two  
15 thousand and forty” and inserting “one thou-  
16 sand five hundred and sixty”, by striking “one  
17 thousand eight hundred and forty hours” and  
18 inserting “one thousand three hundred and  
19 eighty”, and by striking “two thousand and  
20 eighty” and inserting “one thousand five hun-  
21 dred and sixty”,

22                   (C) in subsection (b), by striking “twelve”  
23 and inserting “six” and by striking “fifty-six”  
24 and inserting “forty-five”, and

1 (D) in subsection (e)(5), by striking  
2 “eight” and inserting “six”.

3 (2) SECTION 13.—Section 13(b)(29) (29 U.S.C.  
4 213(b)(29)) is amended by striking out “fifty-six  
5 hours” and inserting “forty-five hours”.

6 **SEC. 202. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

7 The amendments made by section 201 shall take ef-  
8 fect upon the expiration of 180 days after the date of the  
9 enactment of this Act.

10 **TITLE III—WAGES**

11 **SEC. 301. MINIMUM WAGE.**

12 Section 6(a)(1) of the Fair Labor Standards Act of  
13 1938 (29 U.S.C. 206(a)(1)) is amended to read as follows:

14 “(1) except as otherwise provided in this sec-  
15 tion, not less than \$7.00 an hour;”.

16 **SEC. 302. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

17 The amendment made by section 301 shall take effect  
18 upon the expiration of 180 days after the date of the en-  
19 actment of this Act.

20 **TITLE IV—TAX INCENTIVES FOR**  
21 **FULL EMPLOYMENT**

22 **SEC. 401. SENSE OF CONGRESS.**

23 It is the sense of the Congress that appropriate tax  
24 incentives should be provided to businesses that hire new  
25 employees, create new jobs, provide ongoing education and

1 training for their employees, provide child care arrange-  
2 ments for their employees, establish health care plans for  
3 their employees, and undertake research and development.

4           **TITLE V—ENTITLEMENT**  
5           **PROGRAMS**

6 **SEC. 501. SENSE OF CONGRESS.**

7           It is the sense of the Congress that individuals who  
8 receive assistance under any Federal entitlement program  
9 should seek to obtain employment providing livable wages  
10 and, where appropriate, affordable child care arrange-  
11 ments.
