**A BILL**

To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to allow grants to develop more effective programs to reduce juvenile gang participation and juvenile drug trafficking.



1           “(2) the use and sale of illegal drugs by juve-  
2           niles.

3           “(b) USES OF FUNDS.—The grants made under this  
4           section may be used for any of the following specific pur-  
5           poses:

6           “(1) to reduce the participation of juveniles in  
7           drug related crimes (including drug trafficking and  
8           drug use), particularly in and around elementary  
9           and secondary schools;

10          “(2) to reduce juvenile involvement in organized  
11          crime, drug and gang-related activity, particularly  
12          activities that involve the distribution of drugs by or  
13          to juveniles;

14          “(3) to develop new and innovative means to ad-  
15          dress the problems of juveniles convicted of serious,  
16          drug-related and gang-related offenses;

17          “(4) to reduce juvenile drug and gang-related ac-  
18          tivity in public housing projects;

19          “(5) to provide technical assistance and training  
20          to personnel and agencies responsible for the adju-  
21          dicatory and corrections components of the juvenile  
22          justice system to identify drug-dependent or gang-in-  
23          volved juvenile offenders and to provide appropriate  
24          counseling and treatment to such offenders;

1           “(6) to promote the involvement of all juveniles  
2           in lawful activities, including—

3                   “(A) school programs that teach that drug  
4                   and gang involvement are wrong; and

5                   “(B) programs such as youth sports and  
6                   other activities, including girls and boys clubs,  
7                   scout troops, and little leagues;

8           “(7) to facilitate Federal and State cooperation  
9           with local school officials to develop education, pre-  
10          vention and treatment programs for juveniles who are  
11          likely to participate in drug trafficking, drug use or  
12          gang-related activities;

13          “(8) to provide pre- and post-trial drug abuse  
14          treatment to juveniles in the juvenile justice system;  
15          with the highest possible priority to providing drug  
16          abuse treatment to drug-dependent pregnant juveniles  
17          and drug-dependent juvenile mothers;

18          “(9) to provide education and treatment pro-  
19          grams for youth exposed to severe violence in their  
20          homes, schools, or neighborhoods;

21          “(10) to establish sports mentoring and coaching  
22          programs in which athletes serve as role models for  
23          youth to teach that athletics provide a positive alter-  
24          native to drug and gang involvement;

1           “(11) to develop new programs that specifically  
2 address the unique crime, drug, and alcohol-related  
3 challenges faced by juveniles living at or near Inter-  
4 national Ports of Entry and in other international  
5 border communities, including rural localities;

6           “(12) to identify promising new juvenile drug  
7 demand reduction and enforcement programs, to rep-  
8 licate and demonstrate these programs to serve as na-  
9 tional, regional or local models that could be used, in  
10 whole or in part, by other public and private juvenile  
11 justice programs, and to provide technical assistance  
12 and training to public or private organizations to  
13 implement similar programs; and

14           “(13) to coordinate violence, gang, and juvenile  
15 drug prevention programs with other existing Federal  
16 programs that serve community youth to better ad-  
17 dress the comprehensive needs of such youth.

18           “(c) FEDERAL SHARE.—The Federal share of a grant  
19 made under this part may not exceed 75 percent of the total  
20 costs of the projects described in applications submitted  
21 under this section for the fiscal year for which the projects  
22 receive assistance under this part.

23 **“SEC. 1702. APPLICATIONS.**

24           “A State or unit of local government applying for  
25 grants under this part shall submit an application to the

1 *Director in such form and containing such information as*  
2 *the Director shall reasonably require.”.*

3 (b) *CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—The table of contents*  
4 *of title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets*  
5 *Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 3711 et seq.), is amended by striking*  
6 *the matter relating to part Q and inserting the following:*

*“PART Q—JUVENILE DRUG TRAFFICKING AND GANG PREVENTION GRANTS*

*“Sec. 1701. Grant authorization.*

*“Sec. 1702. Applications.*

*“PART R—TRANSITION—EFFECTIVE DATE—REPEALER*

*“Sec. 1801. Continuation of rules, authorities, and proceedings.”.*

7 ***SEC. 2. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.***

8 *Section 1001(a) of title I of the Omnibus Crime Con-*  
9 *trol and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 3793), is*  
10 *amended by adding after paragraph (10) the following:*

11 *“(11) There are authorized to be appropriated*  
12 *\$100,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 1994 and 1995*  
13 *to carry out the projects under part Q.”.*
