Mr. DERRICK, from the Committee on Rules, reported the following resolution; which was referred to the House Calendar and ordered to be printed

RESOLUTION

Providing for consideration of the concurrent resolution (H. Con. Res. 218) setting forth the congressional budget for the United States Government for the fiscal years 1995, 1996, 1997, 1998, and 1999.

1 *Resolved*, That at any time after the adoption of this
2 resolution the Speaker may, pursuant to clause 1(b) of
3 rule XXIII, declare the House resolved into the Committee
4 of the Whole House on the state of the Union for consider-
5 ation of the concurrent resolution (H. Con. Res. 218) set-
6 ting forth the congressional budget for the United States

1 Government for the fiscal years 1995, 1996, 1997, 1998,
2 and 1999. The first reading of the concurrent resolution
3 shall be dispensed with. All points of order against the
4 concurrent resolution and against its consideration are
5 waived. Initial general debate shall be confined to the con-
6 gressional budget and shall not exceed two hours (includ-
7 ing one hour on the subject of economic goals and policies)
8 equally divided and controlled by the chairman and rank-
9 ing minority member of the Committee on the Budget.
10 After initial general debate, an additional period of general
11 debate shall be confined to the subject of the amendment
12 numbered 4 in the report of the Committee on Rules ac-
13 companying this resolution and shall not exceed one hour
14 equally divided and controlled by Representative Kasich
15 of Ohio and an opponent. After general debate on the sub-
16 ject of the amendment numbered 4, an additional period
17 of general debate shall be confined to the subject of the
18 amendment numbered 3 in the report of the Committee
19 on Rules and shall not exceed one hour equally divided
20 and controlled by Representative Mfume of Maryland and
21 an opponent. After general debate on the subject of the
22 amendment numbered 3, the concurrent resolution shall
23 be considered for amendment under the five-minute rule
24 and shall be considered as read. No amendment shall be
25 in order except those printed in the report of the Commit-

tee on Rules. Each amendment may be offered only in the order printed in the report, may be offered only by a Member designated in the report, shall be considered as read, shall be debatable for one hour equally divided and controlled by the proponent and an opponent, and shall not be subject to amendment. All points of order against the amendments printed in the report are waived. If more than one amendment in the nature of a substitute is adopted, only the last to be adopted shall be considered as finally adopted and reported to the House. After the conclusion of consideration of the concurrent resolution for amendment, and a final period of general debate, which shall not exceed ten minutes equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Committee on the Budget, the Committee shall rise and report the concurrent resolution to the House with such amendment as may have been finally adopted. The previous question shall be considered as ordered on the concurrent resolution and amendments thereto to final adoption without intervening motion except amendments offered by the chairman of the Committee on the Budget pursuant to section 305(a)(5) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 to achieve mathematical consistency. The concurrent resolution shall not be subject to a demand for division of the question of its adoption.
