A BILL

To amend the Outer Continental Shelf Lands Act to direct the Secretary of the Interior to cease mineral leasing activity on submerged land of the Outer Continental Shelf that is adjacent to a coastal State that has declared a moratorium on such activity, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Coastal States Protec-
5 tion Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. STATE MORATORIA ON OFFSHORE MINERAL LEAS-**
2 **ING.**

3 Section 8 of the Outer Continental Shelf Lands Act
4 (43 U.S.C. 1337) is amended by adding at the end the
5 following:

6 “(p) STATE MORATORIA.—When there is in effect
7 with respect to lands beneath navigable waters of a coastal
8 State a moratorium on oil, gas, or other mineral explo-
9 ration, development, or production activities established by
10 statute or by order of the Governor, the Secretary shall
11 not issue a lease for the exploration, development, or pro-
12 duction of minerals on submerged lands of the Outer Con-
13 tinental Shelf that are seaward of or adjacent to those
14 lands.”.
