To establish a congressional commemorative medal for organ donors and their families.

Mr. STARK (for himself, Mr. SPENCE, Mr. MOAKLEY, Mr. WALSH, Mr. KLECZKA, Ms. PELOSI, Mrs. THURMAN, Mr. BROWN of California, Mr. FROST, Mr. CUNNINGHAM, and Mr. FRAZER) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Banking and Financial Services, and in addition to the Committee on Commerce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To establish a congressional commemorative medal for organ donors and their families.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Gift of Life Congres-
5 sional Medal Act of 1995”.

1 **SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL.**

2 The Secretary of the Treasury shall design and strike
3 a bronze medal with suitable emblems, devices, and in-
4 scriptions, to be determined by the Secretary of the Treas-
5 ury, to commemorate organ donors and their families.

6 **SEC. 3. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS.**

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—Any organ donor, or the family
8 of any organ donor, shall be eligible for a medal described
9 in section 2.

10 (b) DOCUMENTATION.—The Secretary of Health and
11 Human Services shall direct the entity holding the Organ
12 Procurement and Transplantation Network (hereafter in
13 this Act referred to as “OPTN”) to contract to—

14 (1) establish an application procedure requiring
15 the relevant organ procurement organization, as de-
16 scribed in section 371(b)(1) of the Public Health
17 Service Act (42 U.S.C. 273(b)(1)), through which an
18 individual or their family made an organ donation,
19 to submit to the OPTN contractor documentation
20 supporting the eligibility of that individual or their
21 family to receive a medal described in section 2; and

22 (2) determine, through the documentation pro-
23 vided, and, if necessary, independent investigation,
24 whether the individual or family is eligible to receive
25 a medal described in section 2.

1 **SEC. 4. PRESENTATION.**

2 (a) DELIVERY TO THE SECRETARY OF HEALTH AND
3 HUMAN SERVICES.—The Secretary of the Treasury shall
4 deliver medals struck pursuant to this Act to the Secretary
5 of Health and Human Services.

6 (b) DELIVERY TO ELIGIBLE RECIPIENTS.—The Sec-
7 retary of Health and Human Services shall direct the
8 OPTN contractor to arrange for the presentation to the
9 relevant organ procurement organization all medals struck
10 pursuant to this Act to individuals or families that, in ac-
11 cordance with section 3, the OPTN contractor has deter-
12 mined to be eligible to receive medals under this Act.

13 (c) LIMITATION.—

14 (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para-
15 graph (2), only 1 medal may be presented to a fam-
16 ily under subsection (b).

17 (2) EXCEPTION.—In the case of a family in
18 which more than 1 member is an organ donor, the
19 OPTN contractor may present an additional medal
20 to each such organ donor or their family.

21 **SEC. 5. DUPLICATE MEDALS.**

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Health and
23 Human Services or the OPTN contractor may provide du-
24 plicates of the medal described in section 2 to any recipi-
25 ent of a medal under section 4(b), under such regulations

1 as the Secretary of Health and Human Services may
2 issue.

3 (b) LIMITATION.—The price of a duplicate medal
4 shall be sufficient to cover the cost of such duplicates.

5 **SEC. 6. NATIONAL MEDALS.**

6 The medals struck pursuant to this Act are national
7 medals for purposes of section 5111 of title 31, United
8 States Code.

9 **SEC. 7. GENERAL WAIVER OF PROCUREMENT REGULA-**
10 **TIONS.**

11 No provision of law governing procurement or public
12 contracts shall be applicable to the procurement of goods
13 or services necessary for carrying out the provisions of this
14 Act.

15 **SEC. 8. SOLICITATION OF DONATIONS.**

16 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Treasury
17 may enter into an agreement with the OPTN contractor
18 to collect funds to offset expenditures relating to the issu-
19 ance of medals authorized under this Act.

20 (b) PAYMENT OF FUNDS.—

21 (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para-
22 graph (2), all funds received by the Organ Procure-
23 ment and Transplantation Network under subsection
24 (a) shall be promptly paid by the Organ Procure-

1 ment and Transplantation Network to the Secretary
2 of the Treasury.

3 (2) LIMITATION.—Not more than 5 percent of
4 any funds received under subsection (a) shall be
5 used to pay administrative costs incurred by the
6 OPTN contractor as a result of an agreement estab-
7 lished under this section.

8 (c) NUMISMATIC PUBLIC ENTERPRISE FUND.—Not-
9 withstanding any other provision of law—

10 (1) all amounts received by the Secretary of the
11 Treasury under subsection (b)(1) shall be deposited
12 in the Numismatic Public Enterprise Fund, as de-
13 scribed in section 5134 of title 31, United States
14 Code; and

15 (2) the Secretary of the Treasury shall charge
16 such fund with all expenditures relating to the issu-
17 ance of medals authorized under this Act.

18 (d) START-UP COSTS.—A 1-time amount not to ex-
19 ceed \$55,000 shall be provided to the OPTN contractor
20 to cover initial start-up costs. The amount will be paid
21 back in full within 3 years of the date of the enactment
22 of this Act from funds received under subsection (a).

23 (e) NO NET COST TO THE GOVERNMENT.—The Sec-
24 retary of the Treasury shall take all actions necessary to

1 ensure that the issuance of medals authorized under sec-
2 tion 2 results in no net cost to the Government.

3 **SEC. 9. DEFINITIONS.**

4 For purposes of this Act—

5 (1) the term “organ” means the human kidney,
6 liver, heart, lung, pancreas, and any other human
7 organ (other than corneas and eyes) specified by
8 regulation of the Secretary of Health and Human
9 Services or the OPTN contractor; and

10 (2) the term “Organ Procurement and Trans-
11 plantation Network” means the Organ Procurement
12 and Transplantation Network established under sec-
13 tion 372 of the Public Health Service Act (42
14 U.S.C. 274).
