## A BILL

To modify the application of the antitrust laws to encourage  
the licensing and other use of certain intellectual property.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Intellectual Property  
5 Antitrust Protection Act of 1995”.

6       **SEC. 2. PROHIBITION OF MARKET POWER PRESUMPTION.**

7       In any action in which the conduct of an owner, licen-  
8       sor, licensee, or other holder of an intellectual property  
9       right is alleged to be in violation of the antitrust laws in

1 connection with the marketing or distribution of a product  
2 or service protected by such a right, such right shall not  
3 be presumed to define a market, to establish market power  
4 (including economic power and product uniqueness or dis-  
5 tinctiveness), or to establish monopoly power.

6 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

7 For purposes of this Act—

8 (1) the term “antitrust laws”—

9 (A) has the meaning given it in subsection  
10 (a) of the first section of the Clayton Act (15  
11 U.S.C. 12(a)), except that such term includes  
12 section 5 of the Federal Trade Commission Act  
13 (15 U.S.C. 45) to the extent such section ap-  
14 plies to unfair methods of competition; and

15 (B) includes any State law similar to the  
16 laws referred to in subparagraph (A); and

17 (2) the term “intellectual property right”  
18 means a right, title, or interest—

19 (A) in subject matter patented under title  
20 35, United States Code; or

21 (B) in a work, including a mask work, pro-  
22 tected under title 17, United States Code.
