Mr. FAZIO of California introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Government Reform and Oversight, and in addition to the Committee on Commerce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To allow postal patrons to contribute to funding for breast–cancer research through the voluntary purchase of certain specially issued United States postage stamps.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Breast–Cancer Re-
5 search Stamp Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. SPECIAL POSTAGE STAMPS.**

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—In order to afford the public a
8 convenient way to contribute to funding for breast–cancer

1 research, the United States Postal Service shall establish
2 a special rate of postage for first-class mail under this
3 section.

4 (b) HIGHER RATE.—The rate of postage established
5 under this section—

6 (1) shall be 1 cent higher than the rate that
7 would otherwise apply;

8 (2) may be established without regard to any
9 procedures under chapter 36 of title 39, United
10 States Code, and notwithstanding any other provi-
11 sion of law; and

12 (3) shall be offered as an alternative to the rate
13 that would otherwise apply.

14 The use of the rate of postage established under this sec-
15 tion shall be voluntary on the part of postal patrons.

16 (c) USE OF FUNDS.—

17 (1) IN GENERAL.—The amounts attributable to
18 the 1-cent differential established under this Act
19 shall be paid by the United States Postal Service to
20 the National Institutes of Health under such ar-
21 rangements as those agencies shall by mutual agree-
22 ment establish in order to carry out the purposes of
23 this Act, except that under those arrangements, pay-
24 ments shall be made at least twice a year.

1 (2) AMOUNTS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE 1-CENT
2 DIFFERENTIAL.—For purposes of this subsection,
3 the term “amounts attributable to the 1-cent dif-
4 ferential established under this Act” means, as de-
5 termined by the United States Postal Service under
6 regulations that it shall prescribe—

7 (A) the total amount of revenues received
8 by the United States Postal Service that it
9 would not have received but for the enactment
10 of this Act, reduced by

11 (B) an amount sufficient to cover reason-
12 able administrative and other costs of the Unit-
13 ed States Postal Service attributable to carrying
14 out this Act.

15 (d) SPECIAL POSTAGE STAMPS.—The United States
16 Postal Service may provide for the design and sale of spe-
17 cial postage stamps to carry out this Act.

18 (e) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of the Con-
19 gress that—

20 (1) nothing in this Act should directly or indi-
21 rectly cause a net decrease in total funds received by
22 the National Institutes of Health or any other agen-
23 cy or instrumentality of the Government (or any
24 component or other aspect thereof) below the level

1 that would otherwise have been anticipated absent
2 this Act; and

3 (2) nothing in this Act should affect regular
4 first-class rates or any other regular rate of postage.

5 **SEC. 3. ANNUAL REPORTS.**

6 The Postmaster General shall include in each annual
7 report rendered under section 2402 of title 39, United
8 States Code, information concerning the operation of this
9 Act.

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
