Mr. KENNEDY of Massachusetts introduced the following bill; which was
referred to the Committee on Economic and Educational Opportunities

A BILL

To amend the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 to restrict
employers in obtaining, disclosing, and using of genetic
information.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION. 1. GENETIC INFORMATION.**

4 The Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 (29 U.S.C.
5 201 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the follow-
6 ing:

7 “GENETIC INFORMATION

8 “SEC. 20. (a) No employer may obtain from any
9 source genetic information about an employee or prospec-

1 tive employee unless authorized by such employee or pro-
2 spective employee in accordance with subsection (b).

3 “(b) An authorization for the disclosure of genetic in-
4 formation about an employee or prospective employee to
5 an employer is valid only if each of the following require-
6 ments is met:

7 “(1) The authorization is in writing, signed by
8 the individual making the authorization, and dated
9 on the date of the signature.

10 “(2) The authorization is not on a form used
11 for any other purpose.

12 “(3) The employer authorized to receive the in-
13 formation is specifically named in the authorization.

14 “(4) The authorization contains an acknowledg-
15 ment that the individual making the authorization
16 has received the statement described in subsection
17 (c).

18 “(c) An employer who wishes to receive genetic infor-
19 mation about an employee or prospective employee shall
20 provide the employee or prospective employee with a writ-
21 ten statement of the uses which the employer intends for
22 such genetic information.

23 “(d) If an employer obtains, discloses, or uses genetic
24 information without a valid authorization or not in accord-
25 ance with a statement provided under subsection (c), the

1 employee or prospective employee whose genetic informa-
2 tion was so obtained, disclosed, or used may bring a civil
3 action for actual damages and equitable relief.

4 “(e) Nothing in this section authorizes an employer
5 to obtain, disclose, or use genetic information about an
6 employee or prospective employee in violation of the Amer-
7 icans With Disabilities Act of 1990 or any other Federal
8 or State law that restricts access to, disclosure of, or use
9 of genetic information.”.

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
