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## A BILL

To provide for the recognition and designation of the official society to administer and coordinate the United States of America activities to commemorate and celebrate the achievements of the second millennium, and promote even greater achievements in the millennium to come by endowing an international cross-cultural scholarship

fund to further the development and education of the world's future leaders.

1        *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4        This Act may be cited as the “Millennium Society Act  
5 of 1996”.

6 **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.**

7        As used in this Act:

8            (1) SOCIETY.—The term “Society” means The  
9 Millennium Society recognized under section 103.

10          (2) MILLENNIUM SCHOLARS PROGRAM.—The  
11 term “Millennium Scholars Program” means the  
12 international scholarship program established, en-  
13 dowed, and administered by the Society as described  
14 in section 105(6).

15 **TITLE I—RECOGNITION OF THE**  
16 **MILLENNIUM SOCIETY**

17 **SEC. 101. FINDINGS.**

18        The Congress finds that—

19            (1) the advent of the third millennium on Janu-  
20 ary 1, 2000, provides the citizens of the United  
21 States an opportunity to celebrate the achievements  
22 of civilization to date and to promote even greater  
23 achievements in the millennium to come;

1           (2) as this Nation approaches the third millen-  
2           nium, it is fitting and proper that the citizens of the  
3           United States join the citizens from other nations  
4           around the world in the international celebration of  
5           the new millennium in a manner which encourages  
6           freedom and international peace and understanding;

7           (3) the advent of the third millennium offers  
8           opportunity to bring together young women and men  
9           of excellence from throughout the world, without dis-  
10          tinction as to race, sex, language, or religion, in a  
11          manner which will foster international fellowship and  
12          free and open discourse between all peoples on an  
13          unofficial and nongovernmental basis; and

14          (4) it is appropriate and desirable, therefore, to  
15          designate the Millennium Society to coordinate ac-  
16          tivities in the United States that celebrate the sec-  
17          ond millennium and the achievements of civilization  
18          through the second millennium and to promote even  
19          greater achievements in the third millennium, to co-  
20          ordinate those activities with international efforts,  
21          and to endow and administer a private scholarship  
22          program to prepare young leaders from around the  
23          world for the future millennium.

24 **SEC. 102. PURPOSES.**

25          The purposes of this title are as follows:

1 (1) To recognize the Millennium Society—

2 (A) to promote and coordinate activities in  
3 the United States to commemorate and cele-  
4 brate the achievements of the second millen-  
5 nium;

6 (B) to coordinate these activities with  
7 international efforts; and

8 (C) to administer an international scholar-  
9 ship program to support the education of young  
10 leaders from around the world to promote even  
11 greater achievements in the next millennium.

12 (2) To foster international fellowship and free  
13 and open discourse between all peoples on an unoffi-  
14 cial and nongovernmental basis, helping to develop  
15 friendly relations among nations and individuals to  
16 promote the cause of freedom and peace.

17 (3) To promote international understanding,  
18 tolerance, freedom, peace, cooperation, and genuine  
19 friendship by bringing together young women and  
20 men of excellence, leaders in the arts, sciences, edu-  
21 cation, religion, communications, agriculture, fi-  
22 nance, government, business, journalism, athletics,  
23 diplomacy, medicine, law, and other professions and  
24 fields of endeavor, from throughout the world for  
25 charitable fundraising, education, international ex-

1 change and communication, and other such chari-  
2 table purposes.

3 (4) To sponsor educational conferences, chari-  
4 table fundraisers, and other charitable activities in-  
5 cluding sponsorship of the World Millennium Char-  
6 ity Ball, an international gathering of diverse young  
7 leaders from all continents of the world on Decem-  
8 ber 31, 1999, to celebrate the dawn of the third mil-  
9 lennium.

10 (5) To provide for a Millennium Scholars Pro-  
11 gram, an international cross-cultural scholarship  
12 program, for preparing young leaders from around  
13 the world for even greater achievements in the next  
14 millennium by furthering their education, leadership  
15 abilities, cultural understanding, and dedication to  
16 peace.

17 **SEC. 103. RECOGNITION OF THE MILLENNIUM SOCIETY.**

18 (a) RECOGNITION.—The following organizations are  
19 recognized as “The Millennium Society”:

20 (1) The Millennium Society, a nonprofit cor-  
21 poration of the United States chartered and orga-  
22 nized under the laws of the State of Illinois on No-  
23 vember 21, 1983, and operated exclusively for chari-  
24 table and educational purposes within the meaning

1 of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of  
2 1986, including its members and directors.

3 (2) Any other organization that is organized  
4 and operated by the corporation referred to in para-  
5 graph (1) and is operated exclusively for charitable  
6 and educational purposes within the meaning of sec-  
7 tion 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of  
8 1986.

9 (b) OFFICES.—The Society shall maintain its prin-  
10 cipal offices and national headquarters in such place in  
11 the United States as is determined by the Society, and  
12 may hold its annual and special meetings in such places  
13 as the Society shall determine.

14 **SEC. 104. CONFORMANCE OF ARTICLES OF INCORPORA-**  
15 **TION AND BYLAWS.**

16 The board of directors of the Society shall take such  
17 actions as are necessary to conform the articles of incorpo-  
18 ration and bylaws of the Society to the provisions of this  
19 Act.

20 **SEC. 105. OBJECTS AND PURPOSES OF THE SOCIETY.**

21 The objects and purposes of the Society are recog-  
22 nized as being the following:

23 (1) To establish national goals for commemora-  
24 tion and celebration of the millennium in the United

1 States and participation by the United States in  
2 such international events.

3 (2) To promote and support official celebrations  
4 of the millennium in the United States and to co-  
5 ordinate those celebrations with international com-  
6 memorations and celebrations of the millennium.

7 (3) To exercise exclusive jurisdiction, either di-  
8 rectly or through its constituent members or organs,  
9 over all matters pertaining to the participation of  
10 the United States in commemorations or celebra-  
11 tions of the millennium.

12 (4) To assist organizations and persons con-  
13 cerned with the millennium in commemorations or  
14 celebrations of the millennium.

15 (5) To coordinate activities and hold forums  
16 and symposiums to promote educational and cross-  
17 cultural exchange.

18 (6) To establish, endow, and administer the  
19 Millennium Scholars Program, an international  
20 scholarship program that provides for university  
21 level exchange for exceptional young women and men  
22 from all regions of the world and all pursuits who  
23 have proven leadership abilities, true academic supe-  
24 riority, and a demonstrated desire to further inter-  
25 national understanding in order to better prepare

1 those young leaders for greater achievements in the  
2 next millennium by furthering their education, lead-  
3 ership abilities, cultural understanding, and dedica-  
4 tion to freedom and peace.

5 **SEC. 106. POWERS OF THE SOCIETY.**

6 The Society has perpetual succession and the follow-  
7 ing powers:

8 (1) To adopt and amend articles of incorpora-  
9 tion and bylaws for the management of its property  
10 and the regulation of its affairs, not inconsistent  
11 with the laws of the United States of America or  
12 any State in which the corporation is to operate.

13 (2) To adopt, alter, and use a corporate seal.

14 (3) To choose officers, managers, and agents as  
15 the business of the Society may require.

16 (4) To approve and revoke membership in the  
17 Society.

18 (5) To charge and collect membership dues.

19 (6) To determine the criteria for and establish  
20 subsidiary organs and chapters as may be necessary  
21 to the purposes of the Society.

22 (7) To sue and be sued, complain, and defend  
23 in any court of competent jurisdiction.

24 (8) To make contracts.

1           (9) To establish and maintain offices for the  
2           conduct of the affairs of the Society.

3           (10) To acquire, hold, and dispose of real and  
4           personal property as may be necessary for the pur-  
5           poses of the Society.

6           (11) To accept gifts, legacies, and devises in  
7           furtherance of its Society purposes.

8           (12) To borrow money to carry out the pur-  
9           poses of the Society, including to issue notes, bonds,  
10          or other evidences of indebtedness, and to secure the  
11          same by mortgage, subject in each case to the laws  
12          of the United States or of any State.

13          (13) To provide financial assistance to any or-  
14          ganization or association, other than a corporation  
15          organized for profit, in furtherance of the purposes  
16          of the Society.

17          (14) To conduct campaigns for raising funds  
18          and to accept contributions from individuals, cor-  
19          porations, and other bodies, foundations, and organi-  
20          zations.

21          (15) To print, create, and distribute commemo-  
22          rative coins and medals, edit and publish, make, dis-  
23          play, and sell books and magazines, pictures, slides,  
24          compact discs, videos, cinemas and other commemo-

1 rative items, as may be necessary or desirable for  
2 the accomplishment of the purposes of the Society.

3 (16) To buy, sell, and generally deal in appro-  
4 priate and related souvenirs, commemorative coins,  
5 medals, curios, mementos, and publications.

6 (17) To publish a newsletter, magazine, book,  
7 or other publication and exclusively produce and  
8 broadcast on radio, television, film and other media  
9 consistent with Society purposes.

10 (18) To participate in the production of an  
11 international celebration and sanction related events  
12 within the United States of America.

13 (19) To do any and all acts and things nec-  
14 essary and proper to carry out the purposes of the  
15 Society.

16 **SEC. 107. NONPOLITICAL NATURE OF SOCIETY.**

17 The Society shall be nonpolitical and nonpartisan  
18 and, as an organization, shall not promote the candidacy  
19 of any person seeking public office.

20 **SEC. 108. MEMBERSHIP.**

21 Eligibility for membership in the Society and the  
22 rights and privileges of members shall, except as provided  
23 in this chapter, be determined as the articles of incorpora-  
24 tion and bylaws of the Society may provide.

1 **SEC. 109. ACTIVE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.**

2 (a) COMPOSITION AND CHAIRMAN.—The control and  
3 management of the affairs and funds of the Society shall  
4 be vested in a board of directors as provided in the articles  
5 of incorporation of the Society.

6 (b) TERMS.—The term of each of the members of the  
7 board of directors shall be as provided in the articles of  
8 incorporation or bylaws of the society. The Board shall  
9 elect a permanent board of directors on or before January  
10 1, 2001, to administer the Millennium Scholars Program.

11 (c) MEETINGS.—The board of directors shall meet  
12 not less than twice annually, and at such other times as  
13 may be determined in the manner provided in the articles  
14 of incorporation or bylaws of the Society. No meeting of  
15 the board of directors may be held except at a time and  
16 place stated in the bylaws or in a written notice that is  
17 transmitted to each member at the time and in the man-  
18 ner provided in the bylaws.

19 (d) ELECTION AND REMOVAL.—Directors of the So-  
20 ciety shall be elected at the times and in the manner pro-  
21 vided by the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the  
22 Society and may be removed from office in the manner  
23 provided by the articles of incorporation and bylaws.

24 **SEC. 110. OFFICERS OF THE SOCIETY.**

25 (a) AUTHORIZED POSITIONS.—The officers of the So-  
26 ciety shall be those provided in the articles of incorpora-

1 tion and bylaws of the Society. The board of directors may  
2 modify the composition of the offices of the Society as the  
3 board considers appropriate.

4 (b) PRIVILEGES.—Subject to the provisions of this  
5 Act and the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the  
6 Society, the privileges of the Society’s officers shall be  
7 those prescribed by the board of directors of the Society.

8 (c) COMPENSATION.—Officers may receive compensa-  
9 tion or other remuneration for their services as determined  
10 by the board of directors. An officer may be reimbursed  
11 for the expenses that the officer incurs in the performance  
12 of the duties of the office.

13 (d) ELECTION AND TERM OF OFFICE.—Officers of  
14 the Society shall be elected annually by action of the board  
15 of directors and shall continue in office at the pleasure  
16 of the board.

17 (e) DUTIES.—The duties of the officers of the Society  
18 shall be such as usually pertain to the offices they hold  
19 and shall also include such additional duties as may be  
20 delegated by the board of directors.

21 (f) EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND OTHER PERSON-  
22 NEL.—The board of directors may employ an executive di-  
23 rector and such other paid employees as may be necessary  
24 to assist the officers and the board and to carry out the  
25 programs and business of the Society. The executive direc-

1 tor and the other employees shall serve at the pleasure  
2 of the board of directors. The board shall fix the com-  
3 pensation and prescribe the duties of the executive director  
4 and such other paid employees.

5 **SEC. 111. PROHIBITION ON DISTRIBUTIONS OF INCOME OR**  
6 **ASSETS AND ON LOANS TO MEMBERS.**

7 (a) INCOME AND ASSETS.—Except as provided in  
8 section 110(c), no part of the income or assets of the Soci-  
9 ety shall inure to any of its members, trustees, or officers,  
10 or be distributable to any of them during the life of the  
11 Society or upon its dissolution or final liquidation.

12 (b) LOANS.—The Society may not make loans to offi-  
13 cers, directors, or employees. Any director who votes for  
14 or assents to the making of a loan or advance to an officer,  
15 director, or employee of the Society, and any officer who  
16 participates in the making of such loan or advance shall  
17 be jointly and severally liable to the Society for the amount  
18 of such loan or advance until the repayment thereof.

19 **SEC. 112. LIABILITY FOR ACTS OF OFFICERS AND AGENTS.**

20 The Society shall be liable for the acts of its officers  
21 and agents when acting within the scope of their author-  
22 ity.

1 **SEC. 113. PROHIBITION AGAINST ISSUANCE OF STOCK OR**  
2 **PAYMENT OF DIVIDENDS.**

3 The Society shall have no power to issue capital stock  
4 or to declare or pay any dividends.

5 **SEC. 114. SYMBOLS, EMBLEMS, TRADEMARKS, AND NAMES.**

6 (a) EXCLUSIVE RIGHT.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to the preexisting  
8 rights described in subsection (b), the Society shall  
9 have the sole and exclusive right to use the name  
10 “The Millennium Society” and to have and use in  
11 carrying out its purpose trademarks, symbols, insign-  
12 nia, emblems, seals, descriptive or designating  
13 marks, and slogans as may be required in the fur-  
14 therance of its functions, including “Countdown  
15 2000”, “How to do something great for civilization  
16 and have a ball doing it”, “Millennium Scholars Pro-  
17 gram”, “Millennium Scholar”, “Millennium Schol-  
18 ars”, “Dollars for Scholars”, and “Millennium  
19 Minute” and other such proprietary items as may be  
20 identified.

21 (2) AUTHORIZED USE BY OTHERS.—The Soci-  
22 ety may authorize contributors and suppliers of  
23 goods or services to use the trade name of the Soci-  
24 ety as well as any trademarks, symbols, insignia,  
25 emblems, seals, descriptive or designating marks,  
26 and slogans of the Society in advertising that the

1 contributions, goods, or services were donated, sup-  
2 plied, or furnished to or for the use of, approved, se-  
3 lected, or used by the Society.

4 (b) UNAUTHORIZED USE.—

5 (1) REMEDIES.—Except as provided in para-  
6 graph (2), any person who, without the consent of  
7 the Society, uses for the purpose of trade, to induce  
8 the sale of any goods or services, or to promote any  
9 theatrical exhibition, performance, or competition  
10 any trademark, symbol, insignia, emblem, seal, de-  
11 scriptive or designating mark, or slogan described in  
12 subsection (a)(1) shall be subject to suit in a civil  
13 action by the Society for the remedies provided in  
14 the Act of July 5, 1946 (60 Stat. 427; 15 U.S.C.  
15 1051 et seq.; popularly known as the Trademark Act  
16 of 1946).

17 (2) EXCEPTIONS.—Any person who actually  
18 used the trademark, symbol, insignia, emblem, seal,  
19 descriptive or designating mark, or slogan described  
20 in subsection (a)(1) for any lawful purpose before  
21 the date of the enactment of this Act is not prohib-  
22 ited by this section from continuing such lawful use  
23 for the same purpose and for the same goods or  
24 services. In addition, any person who used, or whose  
25 assignor used, any other trademark, symbol, insig-

1       nia, emblem, seal, descriptive or designating mark,  
2       or slogan described in subsection (a)(1) for any law-  
3       ful purpose prior to such date is not prohibited by  
4       this section from continuing such lawful use for the  
5       same purpose and for the same goods and services.

6       **SEC. 115. AGENTS FOR SERVICE OF PROCESS.**

7       As a condition precedent to the exercise of any power  
8       or privilege granted or conferred under this title, the Soci-  
9       ety shall file in the office of the Secretary of State, or  
10      similar office, in each State the name and post office ad-  
11      dress of an authorized agent of the Society in such State  
12      upon whom local process or demands against the Society  
13      may be served.

14      **SEC. 116. BOOKS AND RECORDS.**

15      The Society shall keep correct and complete books  
16      and records of account and shall keep minutes of the pro-  
17      ceedings of its members, board of directors, and commit-  
18      tees having any authority under the board of directors,  
19      and it shall also keep at its principal office a record of  
20      the names and addresses of its members entitled to vote.  
21      All books and records of the corporation may be inspected  
22      by any member entitled to vote, or the agent or attorney  
23      of such member, for any proper purpose, at any reason-  
24      able time.

1 **SEC. 117. AUDIT OF FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY.**

2 (a) AUDITS.—Section 1 of the Act entitled “An Act  
3 to provide for audit of accounts of private corporations  
4 established under Federal law,” approved August 30,  
5 1964 (36 U.S.C. 1101) is amended by adding at the end  
6 the following:

7 “(77) The Millennium Society.”

8 (b) USE OF CAPITOL GROUNDS.—Section 451 of the  
9 Legislative Reorganization Act of 1970 (40 U.S.C. 193m–  
10 1) applies to the Society in accordance with the provisions  
11 of such section.

12 **SEC. 118. USE OF ASSETS UPON DISSOLUTION OR LIQUIDA-**  
13 **TION.**

14 Upon dissolution or final liquidation of the Society,  
15 after discharge or satisfaction of all outstanding obliga-  
16 tions and liabilities, any remaining assets of the Society  
17 shall be distributed in accordance with the determination  
18 of the board of directors of the Society and in compliance  
19 with the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the Society  
20 and all Federal and State laws applicable thereto.

21 **SEC. 119. RESERVATION OF RIGHT TO AMEND OR REPEAL**  
22 **CHAPTER.**

23 The right to alter, amend, or repeal this title at any  
24 time is hereby expressly reserved.

1 **SEC. 120. REPORTS TO PRESIDENT AND CONGRESS ON OP-**  
2 **ERATIONS.**

3 The Society shall, on or before June 1 of each year,  
4 transmit simultaneously to the President and to each  
5 House of Congress a detailed report of its operations for  
6 the preceding calendar year. The report shall include a  
7 complete statement of its receipts and expenditures and  
8 a comprehensive description of the activities and accom-  
9 plishments of the Society during the preceding year. Cop-  
10 ies of the report shall be made available by the Society  
11 to interested persons at a reasonable cost.

12 **TITLE II—COMMEMORATIVE**  
13 **COINS**

14 **SEC. 201. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.**

15 (a) DENOMINATIONS.—In commemoration of the end  
16 of the second millennium and the advent of the third mil-  
17 lennium, the Secretary of the Treasury (hereafter in this  
18 Act referred to as the “Secretary”) shall mint and issue  
19 the following coins:

20 (1) \$5 GOLD COINS.—Not more than 100,000  
21 \$5 coins, each of which shall—

22 (A) weigh 8.359 grams;

23 (B) have a diameter of 0.850 inches; and

24 (C) contain 90 percent gold and 10 percent  
25 alloy.

1           (2) \$1 SILVER COINS.—Not more than 650,000  
2       \$1 coins, each of which shall—

3           (A) weigh 26.73 grams;

4           (B) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and

5           (C) contain 90 percent silver and 10 per-  
6       cent copper.

7       (b) PLATINUM COINS.—In addition to the coins mint-  
8       ed and issued under subsection (a), if the Secretary deter-  
9       mines such action to be appropriate, the Secretary may  
10      mint and issue not more than 100,000 \$5 coins, each of  
11      which shall—

12           (1) contain platinum in an amount prescribed  
13      by the Secretary; and

14           (2) meet such other specifications as the Sec-  
15      retary shall prescribe.

16      (c) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this  
17      Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of  
18      title 31, United States Code.

19      (d) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of section  
20      5134 of title 31, United States Code, all coins minted  
21      under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.

22      **SEC. 202. SOURCES OF BULLION.**

23      (a) GOLD.—The Secretary shall obtain gold for mint-  
24      ing coins under this Act pursuant to the authority of the  
25      Secretary under other provisions of law.

1 (b) SILVER.—The Secretary shall obtain silver for  
2 minting coins under this Act only from stockpiles estab-  
3 lished under the Strategic and Critical Materials Stock  
4 Piling Act.

5 **SEC. 203. DESIGN OF COINS.**

6 (a) DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—The design of the coins  
8 minted under this Act shall be emblematic of the  
9 events of the second millennium and the advent of  
10 the third millennium.

11 (2) DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.—On  
12 each coin minted under this Act there shall be—

13 (A) a designation of the value of the coin;

14 (B) an inscription of the dates “December  
15 31, 1999” and “January 1, 2000”;

16 (C) inscriptions of the words “The Second  
17 Millennium”, “Freedom, Understanding,  
18 Peace”, “United States of America” and “Com-  
19 memoration of the Past-Celebration of the Fu-  
20 ture”; and

21 (D) such other inscriptions as the Sec-  
22 retary shall prescribe after consultation with  
23 the Society.

24 (b) SELECTION.—The design for the coins minted  
25 under this Act shall be—

1           (1) selected by the Secretary after consultation  
2           with the board of directors of the Society and the  
3           Commission of Fine Arts; and

4           (2) reviewed by the Citizens Commemorative  
5           Coin Advisory Committee.

6 **SEC. 204. ISSUANCE OF COINS.**

7           (a) **QUALITY OF COINS.**—Coins minted under this  
8           Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

9           (b) **MINT FACILITY.**—Only 1 facility of the United  
10          States Mint may be used to strike any particular combina-  
11          tion of denomination and quality of the coins minted under  
12          this Act.

13          (c) **PERIOD FOR ISSUANCE.**—The Secretary may  
14          issue coins minted under this Act only during the period  
15          beginning on July 1, 1999, and ending on January 1,  
16          2001.

17 **SEC. 205. SALE OF COINS.**

18          (a) **SALE PRICE.**—The coins issued under this Act  
19          shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum  
20          of—

21                 (1) the face value of the coins;

22                 (2) the surcharge provided in subsection (d)  
23          with respect to such coins; and

1           (3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins  
2           (including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,  
3           overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

4           (b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk  
5 sales of the coins issued under this Act at a reasonable  
6 discount.

7           (c) PREPAID ORDERS.—

8           (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept  
9           prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act  
10          before the issuance of such coins.

11          (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre-  
12          paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea-  
13          sonable discount.

14          (d) SURCHARGES.—All sales shall include a sur-  
15 charge of—

16           (1) \$35 per coin for the \$5 coin; and

17           (2) \$10 per coin for the \$1 coin.

18 **SEC. 206. GENERAL WAIVER OF PROCUREMENT REGULA-**  
19 **TIONS.**

20          (a) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in subsection  
21 (b), no provision of law governing procurement or public  
22 contracts shall be applicable to the procurement of goods  
23 and services necessary for carrying out the provisions of  
24 this Act.

1           (b) EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.—Sub-  
2 section (a) shall not relieve any person entering into a con-  
3 tract under the authority of this Act from complying with  
4 any law relating to equal employment opportunity.

5 **SEC. 207. DISTRIBUTION OF SURCHARGES.**

6           (a) IN GENERAL.—All surcharges received by the  
7 Secretary from the sale of coins issued under this Act shall  
8 be promptly paid by the Secretary to the Society, to be  
9 used only for the purpose of supporting the Millennium  
10 Scholars Program.

11           (b) AUDITS.—The Comptroller General of the United  
12 States shall have the right to examine such books, records,  
13 documents, and other data of the Society as may be relat-  
14 ed to the expenditures of amounts paid under subsection  
15 (a).

16           (c) CONDITIONS ON PAYMENT OF SURCHARGES.—

17               (1) PAYMENT OF SURCHARGES.—Notwithstand-  
18 ing any other provision of law, no payment shall be  
19 paid to the Society under this section unless—

20                       (A) all numismatic operation and program  
21 costs allocable to the program under which the  
22 coins are produced and sold have been recov-  
23 ered; and

24                       (B) the Society submits an audited finan-  
25 cial statement which demonstrates to the satis-

1           faction of the Secretary that, with respect to  
2           the purpose described in subsection (a), the So-  
3           ciety has raised funds from private sources for  
4           that purpose in an amount that is equal to or  
5           greater than the maximum amount that the So-  
6           ciety may receive under this section.

7           (2) ANNUAL AUDITS.—

8                   (A) ANNUAL AUDITS OF RECIPIENTS RE-  
9                   QUIRED.—As a condition for receiving any pay-  
10                  ment under this section, the Society shall pro-  
11                  vide for an annual audit, conducted in accord-  
12                  ance with generally accepted government audit-  
13                  ing standards by an independent public ac-  
14                  countant selected by the Society, of all pay-  
15                  ments made to the Society under this section  
16                  beginning in the first fiscal year of the Society  
17                  in which any such payment is received and con-  
18                  tinuing until all payments received by the Soci-  
19                  ety under this section are fully expended or  
20                  placed in trust.

21                   (B) MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR AN-  
22                   NUAL AUDITS.—At a minimum, each audit pur-  
23                  suant to subparagraph (A) shall report—

24                           (i) the amount of payments received  
25                           by the Society under this section during

1 the fiscal year of the Society for which the  
2 audit is conducted;

3 (ii) the amount expended by the Soci-  
4 ety from the proceeds of such surcharges  
5 during the fiscal year of the Society for  
6 which the audit is conducted; and

7 (iii) whether all expenditures by the  
8 Society during the fiscal year of the Soci-  
9 ety for which the audit is conducted from  
10 the proceeds of such surcharges were for  
11 the purpose described in subsection (a).

12 (C) RESPONSIBILITY TO ACCOUNT FOR EX-  
13 PENDITURES OF SURCHARGES.—As a condition  
14 of receiving any payment under this section, the  
15 Society shall take appropriate steps to ensure  
16 that the receipt of the payment and the expend-  
17 iture of the proceeds of the surcharge by the  
18 Society in each fiscal year of the Society can be  
19 accounted for separately from all other revenues  
20 and expenditures of the Society.

21 **SEC. 208. FINANCIAL ASSURANCES.**

22 (a) NO NET COST TO THE GOVERNMENT.—The Sec-  
23 retary shall take such actions as may be necessary to en-  
24 sure that minting and issuing coins under this Act will

1 not result in any net cost to the United States Govern-  
2 ment.

3 (b) PAYMENT FOR COINS.—A coin shall not be issued  
4 under this Act unless the Secretary has received—

5 (1) full payment for the coin;

6 (2) security satisfactory to the Secretary to in-  
7 demnify the United States for full payment; or

8 (3) a guarantee of full payment satisfactory to  
9 the Secretary from a depository institution whose  
10 deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insur-  
11 ance Corporation or the National Credit Union Ad-  
12 ministration Board.

### 13 **TITLE III—COMMEMORATIVE** 14 **POSTAGE STAMPS**

#### 15 **SEC. 301. SENSE OF THE CONGRESS.**

16 It is the sense of the Congress that the United States  
17 Postal Service should cooperate with the Secretary and the  
18 Society—

19 (1) in the issuance of appropriate first day of  
20 issuance postage stamps commemorating the end of  
21 the second millennium and the advent of the third  
22 millennium; and

23 (2) in the production of a philatelic numismatic  
24 combination as a unique item to be made available

- 1 to the public to commemorate the end of the second
- 2 millennium and the advent of the third millennium.
