Mr. THOMAS of California submitted the following resolution; which was
referred to the Committee on House Oversight

RESOLUTION

Providing amounts for the expenses of certain committees
of the House of Representatives in the One Hundred
Fourth Congress.

1 *Resolved,*

2 **SECTION 1. COMMITTEE EXPENSES FOR THE ONE HUN-**
3 **DRED FOURTH CONGRESS.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—With respect to the One Hundred
5 Fourth Congress, there shall be paid out of the applicable
6 accounts of the House of Representatives, in accordance
7 with this primary expense resolution, not more than the
8 amount specified in subsection (b) for the expenses of each
9 committee named in that subsection, including—

10 (1) the expenses of all staff salaries;

1 (2) the expenses of consultant services under
2 section 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act
3 of 1946 (2 U.S.C. 72a(i)); and

4 (3) the expenses of staff training under section
5 202(j) of such Act (2 U.S.C. 72a(j)).

6 (b) COMMITTEES AND AMOUNTS.—The committees
7 and amounts referred to in subsection (a) are: Committee
8 on Agriculture, \$7,590,139; Committee on Banking and
9 Financial Services, \$8,786,054; Committee on the Budget,
10 \$10,038,000; Committee on Commerce, \$15,648,577;
11 Committee on Economic and Educational Opportunities,
12 \$9,687,275; Committee on Government Reform and Over-
13 sight, \$13,639,857; Committee on House Oversight,
14 \$6,394,121; Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence,
15 \$4,622,090; Committee on International Relations,
16 \$10,551,875; Committee on the Judiciary, \$9,683,190;
17 Committee on National Security, \$9,981,615; Committee
18 on Resources, \$10,926,383; Committee on Rules,
19 \$4,435,817; Committee on Science, \$8,642,826; Commit-
20 tee on Small Business, \$3,812,580; Committee on Stand-

1 **SEC. 2. FIRST SESSION LIMITATIONS.**

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Of the amount provided for in
3 section 1 for each committee named in subsection (b), not
4 more than the amount specified in such subsection shall
5 be available for expenses incurred during the period begin-
6 ning at noon on January 3, 1995, and ending immediately
7 before noon on January 3, 1996.

8 (b) COMMITTEES AND AMOUNTS.—The committees
9 and amounts referred to in subsection (a) are: Committee
10 on Agriculture, \$3,961,388 (of which \$30,000 may be
11 used for consultant services and \$1,000 may be used for
12 staff training); Committee on Banking and Financial
13 Services, \$4,286,579; Committee on the Budget,
14 \$5,013,000; Committee on Commerce, \$7,625,910 (of
15 which \$25,000 may be used for consultant services); Com-
16 mittee on Economic and Educational Opportunities,
17 \$4,815,332 (of which \$5,000 may be used for staff train-
18 ing); Committee on Government Reform and Oversight,
19 \$6,618,689 (of which \$25,000 may be used for consultant
20 services and \$5,000 may be used for staff training); Com-
21 mittee on House Oversight, \$3,250,783 (of which
22 \$500,000 may be used for consultant services and \$20,000
23 may be used for staff training); Permanent Select Com-
24 mittee on Intelligence, \$2,277,210 (of which \$3,200 may
25 be used for staff training); Committee on International
26 Relations, \$5,097,254 (of which \$10,000 may be used for

1 consultant services); Committee on the Judiciary,
2 \$4,672,187 (of which \$8,000 may be used for staff train-
3 ing); Committee on National Security, \$4,769,362 (of
4 which \$40,000 may be used for consultant services and
5 \$12,000 may be used for staff training); Committee on
6 Resources, \$5,210,815 (of which \$45,000 may be used for
7 consultant services and \$1,000 may be used for staff
8 training); Committee on Rules, \$2,200,567 (of which \$500
9 may be used for staff training); Committee on Science,
10 \$4,211,654 (of which \$20,000 may be used for consultant
11 services and \$15,800 may be used for staff training);
12 Committee on Small Business, \$1,873,290; Committee on
13 Standards of Official Conduct, \$1,063,650 (of which
14 \$50,000 may be used for consultant services); Committee
15 on Transportation and Infrastructure, \$6,057,934 (of
16 which \$5,000 may be used for consultant services and
17 \$5,000 may be used for staff training); Committee on Vet-
18 erans' Affairs, \$2,084,500 (of which \$10,000 may be used
19 for staff training); and Committee on Ways and Means,
20 \$4,976,231.

21 **SEC. 3. SECOND SESSION LIMITATIONS.**

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—Of the amount provided for in
23 section 1 for each committee named in subsection (b), not
24 more than the amount specified in such subsection shall
25 be available for expenses incurred during the period begin-

1 ning at noon on January 3, 1996, and ending immediately
2 before noon on January 3, 1997.

3 (b) COMMITTEES AND AMOUNTS.—The committees
4 and amounts referred to in subsection (a) are: Committee
5 on Agriculture, \$3,628,751 (of which \$15,000 may be
6 used for consultant services and \$1,000 may be used for
7 staff training); Committee on Banking and Financial
8 Services, \$4,499,475; Committee on the Budget,
9 \$5,025,000; Committee on Commerce, \$8,022,667 (of
10 which \$25,675 may be used for consultant services); Com-
11 mittee on Economic and Educational Opportunities,
12 \$4,871,943 (of which \$5,000 may be used for staff train-
13 ing); Committee on Government Reform and Oversight,
14 \$7,021,168 (of which \$25,000 may be used for consultant
15 services and \$5,000 may be used for staff training); Com-
16 mittee on House Oversight, \$3,143,338 (of which
17 \$130,000 may be used for consultant services and \$22,000
18 may be used for staff training); Permanent Select Com-
19 mittee on Intelligence, \$2,344,880 (of which \$3,200 may
20 be used for staff training); Committee on International
21 Relations, \$5,454,621 (of which \$10,000 may be used for
22 consultant services); Committee on the Judiciary,
23 \$5,011,003 (of which \$10,000 may be used for staff train-
24 ing); Committee on National Security, \$5,212,253 (of
25 which \$40,000 may be used for consultant services and

1 \$15,000 may be used for staff training); Committee on
2 Resources, \$5,715,568 (of which \$1,000 may be used for
3 staff training); Committee on Rules, \$2,235,250 (of which
4 \$500 may be used for staff training); Committee on
5 Science, \$4,431,172 (of which \$20,000 may be used for
6 consultant services and \$16,500 may be used for staff
7 training); Committee on Small Business, \$1,939,290;
8 Committee on Standards of Official Conduct, \$1,026,500
9 (of which \$50,000 may be used for consultant services);
10 Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure,
11 \$6,356,535 (of which \$5,000 may be used for consultant
12 services and \$5,000 may be used for staff training); Com-
13 mittee on Veterans' Affairs, \$2,257,105 (of which \$10,000
14 may be used for staff training); and Committee on Ways
15 and Means, \$5,362,109.

16 **SEC. 4. VOUCHERS.**

17 Payments under this resolution shall be made on
18 vouchers authorized by the committee involved, signed by
19 the chairman of such committee, and approved in the
20 manner directed by the Committee on House Oversight.

21 **SEC. 5. REGULATIONS.**

22 Amounts made available under this resolution shall
23 be expended in accordance with regulations prescribed by
24 the Committee on House Oversight.

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
