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It is noted that "The New York Times" on September 28, 1963, carried an article by Tad Szulc, datelined at Washington, D. C., on September 27, 1963, outlining testimony given by I. Irving Davidson before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on March 8, 1963, which testimony was released on September 27, 1963.

On October 7, 1963, a confidential informant, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished the following information concerning a contact between the subject and General Julio C. Morales, Military and Air Attache, Embassy of Nicaragua, which contact possibly concerns Davidson's appearance before the above-mentioned Senate Committee. Davidson told Morales that he had just received some reports from some people in Panama, Nicaragua, and Ecuador which said that Davidson spoke very well of Nicaragua. He continued by stating that no one is jumping on him and he has the impression that no one is jumping on Morales either, and feels that Morales came out better all the way around because Morales acts only on orders. After discussion of which Latin American papers carried "the story" Davidson commented that the "General" never told him he was through working for Nicaragua and until he is told so he will continue to work for Nicaragua. Morales is of the opinion that the "General" will not tell Davidson he is through.

Morales then outlined a letter he was preparing to send the "General" wherein he wished to completely inform the "General" of Davidson's statement before a Senate Committee which was investigating Davidson's activities as an agent for Nicaragua, Ecuador, Israel, and Indonesia. Morales, in his letter, indicated that he had talked to Davidson and felt that

[Morales] (S) also noted that [Frank Barry] (S) also loaned Davidson money in that transaction (X)

[Morales] (S) also noted in his letter that [Davidson] (S) spoke very highly of Nicaragua and that although he had to make certain statements which are true the "General" could very well see that there was no wrong in it (X)

According to the informant, [the above contact was] (S) concluded with Morales stating that [he] (S) believes everything will be all right but also indicating that he will be on his guard all the time and with Davidson stating that he would be glad to make a trip to Nicaragua to be interviewed by the press [on Morales' behalf] (X)

(S) Reference to the "General," mentioned above, is a possible reference to General Anastasio Somoza, head of the Nicaraguan National Guard. (X) (u)
