Organization and Mission—Field

**MISSION AND ORGANIZATION OF HQ ELECTRONIC SECURITY, EUROPE (ESE);
ELECTRONIC SECURITY, PACIFIC (ESP); ELECTRONIC SECURITY, STRATEGIC (ESS);
AND ELECTRONIC SECURITY, TACTICAL (EST)**

This regulation states the mission, organization, and responsibilities of HQ ESE, ESP, ESS, and EST.

NOTE: Consult USAFINTEL 201-6 when extracting and combining unclassified information from this regulation. Combining individual unclassified paragraphs may warrant classification.

1. Mission. The mission of HQ ESE, ESP, ESS, and EST is to:

a. Exercise command and control over assigned ESC resources.

b. Provide or arrange for ESC products, services, and forces in support of the designated AF MAJCOM's commander, staff, and units.

c. Assist the designated MAJCOM commander and staff to develop Command, Control, and Communications Countermeasures (C³CM) programs.

2. Organization. HQ ESE, ESP, ESS, and EST are Air Force-controlled (AFCON) units; assigned to ESC; and physically colocated with HQ USAFE, PACAF, SAC, and TAC, respectively. HQ ESE, ESP, ESS, and EST are organized according to AFR 26-2. Attachment 1 shows the authorized internal unit organization. The commander may authorize a further organizational breakout if it is consistent with AFR 26-2. The addition of new elements or movement of functions between elements must first have HQ ESC's approval. ESC units assigned to HQ ESE, ESP, ESS, and EST for command and control are stated in attachment 2.

3. Responsibilities. The Commanders, HQ ESE, ESP, ESS, and EST, are responsible for ensuring that their units do the following:

a. Exercise command and control over assigned ESC units and write effectiveness reports on the commanders of their assigned ESC units, except when different arrangements are agreed to in separate memorandums of understanding.

(1) Ensure maximum use of assigned resources.

(2) Manage Total Force Programs according to ESCR 528-1.

(3) Issue guidance to assigned units to resolve problems or to correct unfavorable conditions.

(4) Coordinate, negotiate, and resolve administrative, logistical, and Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) matters involving in-theater support of assigned units.

(5) Provide for the general welfare, morale, and health of assigned ESC personnel.

(6) Administer discipline under the UCMJ and obtain UCMJ advice and assistance from designated activities. Special court-martial jurisdiction is not exercised.

b. Provide the supported commander, the staff, and units advice and assistance on all aspects of the ESC mission. This includes:

(2) Assistance in planning, implementing, and refining offensive and defensive C³CM capability.

(3) Identification of requirements for and proper tasking of ESC support according to AFR 28-3.

[REDACTED]

(5) Provision of information on electronic warfare (EW) analysis support to include an exchange of EW data requirements and products. This includes providing information on analytic methods, data inputs, evaluation techniques, and effectiveness criterions.

(6) Assistance in the development and statement of offensive and defensive C³CM signal security (SIGSEC) and operational security (OPSEC) requirements to support current theater activities and planned operations. This includes assistance in identifying ESC tasking according to AFM 100-45 and AFR 55-30 (HQ ESE and ESP only).

(7) Provision of specialized ESC C³CM resources for imitative communications deception, manipulative communications deception, and communications jamming to USAF tests, exercises, and operations.

d. Keep the Commander, ESC, informed on new developments, requirements, and changes within the supported command that impact on the ESC responsibility to plan and program for resources to support combat operations.

e. Identify the communications support required by field-deployed ESC elements and provide the requirements to the supported commander in advance of any deployment (Exception: HQ EST).

4. Relationships:

a. HQ ESE, ESP, ESS, and EST obtain and receive administrative and logistical support as provided for in AFR 11-4, DOD 4000.19M, and intercommand memorandums of agreement as appropriate.

b. The Commanders, HQ ESE, ESS, ESP, and EST:

(1) Are authorized direct communication with any DOD unit or activity in their geographical sphere of operation to accomplish the mission.

(2) Refer questions on policy matters to HQ ESC.


